Ready for Auto Cup Races.

Dublin, July 1.—All eyes in the automobile world are at present turned toward the Emerald Isle and during the two weeks beginning today little else will be talked of among those devoted to the sport than the Gordon Bennett cup race and the other interesting events on the two weeks' program. Automobile owners and manufacturers to a total of several thousand are gathered in Dublin, coming from the United States, England, France, Germany Belgium and other countries. Today the Mecca for them all was Earlsfort Rink, where the cars which are to compete in the cup race were on exhibition. This afternoon the cars were weighed in according to the articles governing the contest.

Arrangements for the cup race are practically complete. The start will be made at an early hour tomorrow from near Old Kilcullen, a town about 30 miles southwest of this city. Throughout the length of the route, which measures about 370 miles, the public has been warned to keep off the course, police have been posted at every crossing and other precautions taken to prevent accident. An interesting feature of the arrangements has been the posting of immense clocks on the roadside at each point of division so that the flying competitors may learn from time to time the distance they have covered and the rate of speed. The road has been smoothed throughout its length. Sharp corners have been rounded and the more dangerous points have been marked with flags.

After the cup race has been run there will be a series of interesting events that will afford a veritable two weeks' carnival of sport and pleasure for the automobilists. The chief features of the program as arranged are as follows:

Friday, July 3.—Gymkhana at Phoenix Park, Dublin.

Saturday, July 4.—Speed trials in Phoenix Park.

Monday, July 6.—Tour to Newcastle and Belfast.

Tuesday, July 7.—Four mile time test at Newcastle. Hill climbing trial for Henry Edmund's trophy.

Thursday, July 9.—Start for Cork.

Friday, July 10.—Arrival at Cork. Eliminating race for motor boats at Queenstown in morning. Speed or hill climbing trial in afternoon.

Saturday, July 11.—Motor boat race for Harmsworth cup at Queenstown.

Monday, July 13.—Start of tour through beautiful scenery of the South.

Tuesday, July 14.—Arrival at Killarney.

Wednesday, July 15.—Hill climbing trial on the Kilgoblin-Tralee road for the County of Kerry Cup, and termination of the official tour.

He thinks the time will be slow, owing to the dusty roads and dangerous places. He predicts the winner's average time won't exceed 45 miles an hour. It will probably be after midnight when the winner is officially announced.

PROCLAMATION.

Protection of Timber and Other Property from Fire.

Whereas, it is provided by Sections 1787, 1788, 1789, 1790, 1791, and 1792 of Bellinger and Cotton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon, as follows:

"Section 1787. If any person shall maliciously, with intent to injure any other person, by himself or other person, kindle a fire on his own land or the land of any other person, and by means of such fire the buildings, fences, crops, or other personal property or wooded timber lands of any other person shall be destroyed or injured, he shall, on conviction, be punished by a fine not less than twenty dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than twelve months, according to the aggravation of the offense.

"Sec. 1788. If any person shall, without malice kindle any fire in any field, pasture, inclosure, forest, prairie, or timber land not his own, without the consent of the owner, and the same shall spread and do damage to any buildings, fences, crops, cordwood, bark, or other personal property not his own, or to any wood or timber land not his own, he shall, on conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs according to aggravation of the offense, and shall stand committed until the fine and costs are paid.

fense, and shall stand committed until the fine and costs are paid.

"Sec. 1789. Any person who shall enter upon the lands of another person for the purpose of hunting or fishing, and shall without the consent of the owner of said lands, kindle any fire thereon, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars; and if such fire be kindled maliciously, and with the intent to injure any other person, such offender shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than twelve months.

"Sec. 1790. Any person or persons who shall willfully set fire to any wooded country or forest belonging to the State or the United States, or to any person or persons, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction before a court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment: Provided, that nothing herein contained shall apply to any person who in good faith sets a back fire to prevent the extension of fire already burning.

"Sec. 1791. Upon any prosecution under this act, one half of the fine imposed shall be paid to the person who first gives information thereof to the district attorney for the district in which the offense is committed, and the other moiety shall be paid into the county treasury for the benefit of the common school fund of the county in which said fine is collected.

"Sec. 1792. It is hereby made the duty of the governor of this state to issue a proclamation on the first day of July of each year, calling public attention to the provisions of this act and warning all persons against violating the same. It is also made the duty of each circuit judge of this state to read the provisions of this act to each grand jury when charging them as to their duties."

Now, Therefore, I, Geo. E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby direct the attention of the public to the provisions of the sections hereinabove referred to, and warn all persons against the violation thereof.

Done at the Capitol at Salem, Oregon, this First day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and three.
