Penitentiary, during the period end-
ing December 31, 1903.
Sealed bids for Dry Goods, Grocer-
ies, Shoes, Leather and Findings,
Plumbing Supplies, Hardware, Flour,
Oats and Mill Feed, Fish, Meats, etc.,
will be received at the office of the
Superintendent of the State Peniten-
tiary until Thursday, July 9th, 1903,
at 3 o'clock p. m., at which time they
will be opened.

A deposit of \$200.00 in cash or cer-
tified check payable to the superin-
tendent must accompany each bid for
meat, and of \$75 for bids for flour and
fish, all other bids must be accompa-
nied by an amount equal to 10 per cent
of the amount of the bid.
The right is reserved to reject any
and all bids and to accept or reject
any portion of a bid.

On each envelope should be in-
scribed the nature of the bid. Goods of
Oregon manufacture or production
will receive preference, other things
being equal.

All goods and supplies must be de-
livered to the Penitentiary within 20
days after the contract is awarded,
unless otherwise provided in con-
tract.

Schedules of the various lines of
goods will be furnished upon applica-
tion to the Superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for pay-
ment on the first of the month follow-
ing completion of contract, and
monthly on continuous contracts.

Samples must accompany bids for
Dry Goods, Groceries, Flour and all
other articles where practicable.

TEDDY MET THE GOVERNOR

Both Men Had a Wrist Broken in Athletic Exercises

Roosevelt Expresses the Opinion That the Gover- nor is a Dead Game Sport

The fact has never been commented
on that Governor Chamberlain was
grasped by the hand by President
Roosevelt after he had delivered his
address at Salem on the occasion of
the president's visit before the presi-
dent shook hands with anyone else,
and before the governor could arise
to greet the president, the president
had approached and grabbed Cham-
berlain by the hand and shook it
warmly complimenting and congratu-
lating him on his address. Governor
Chamberlain had compared the presi-
dent to Jefferson and that pleased
Roosevelt very much. A Democrat in
the crowd was so pleased with Roose-
velt's vote-getting address that he
cried out "another Lincoln" and
swore he'd vote for him if he ran for
president. The governor rode with
Roosevelt on the train to Portland
and found him a very genial and
pleasant man to meet socially. In
talking with him about athletic exer-
cises, Chamberlain remarked that he
kept up a great deal of athletic prac-
tice until he broke his left hand in
boxing. "I broke my left hand, too,"
said Roosevelt, "only I broke it wrest-
ling, and I am different from you. I
have kept it up." At the banquet at
Hotel Portland Chamberlain and
Roosevelt got still better acquainted
and at the end of the formalities
Roosevelt drew Chamberlain into a
conversation on all kinds of matters
outside of politics. At the end of
their heart to heart talk, and before
separating Teddy said to Cham-
berlain: "I believe away down in my
heart, Governor, that you are a dead
game sport."

FRUIT GOES TO PORTLAND

Directors of the Union Gets a Raise on Berries

Three-Quarters of a Cent Advance on Some Lines of Cannery Stock

The directors of the Salem Fruit
Growers' Union met at 3 p. m. at the
office of the president, and considered
bids for the crop of raspberries and
blackberries and Logan berries. Fol-
lowing were received and opened:

R. J. Holmes, Portland Canning Co.,
Portland—Raspberries 4 1/4 cents per
pound.

Blackberries, 3 cents per pound.

These prices are for fruit delivered
for shipment by boat or express to
Portland. Berries must be picked
clean, free from leaves or dirt. Mr.
Holmes pays freight to Portland, and
crates can be returned at a nominal
charge.

The other bid was from G. W. Hol-
comb, of the Salem Canning Co.—
Raspberries, 3 1/4 cents; blackberries,
2 1/4 cents; Logan berries, 2 1/4 cents.

These prices are for fruit delivered at
the Salem cannery. On motion the
bid of R. J. Holmes was unanimously
accepted, and the officers of the Union
ordered to enter into contract with Mr.
Holmes on the above terms, and all
members to be notified.

The expense for returning crates
from Portland will be about three
cents per hundred pounds, no ship-
ment for less than 25 cents. Under
the terms of this contract a large
quantity of fruit will go to the Holmes
cannery at Portland, and it is possible
that Mr. Holmes may open a cannery
at Salem next year.

Big Logan-Berry Crop.

Alex LaFollett has a crop of 500 to
750 crates of Logan berries, which are
now in full fruit, and a sight worth
seeing. Mr. LaFollett has some very
rich bottom land on the banks of a
natural lake that has perfect drain-
age, and a beautiful exposure to the
sun and air. Last year he planted a
second field of Logans, and, with his
2-year-old patch, he has his hands
full harvesting the crop. A force of
pickers are at work every day, and
the legislator who killed the scalp
bounty bill, superintends the packing
and delivery to market. They bring
\$1.25 a crate at Salem, and are about
the finest fruit of the kind ever
brought to this market. Mr. LaFollett
has his second lot on a high wire trellis,
and the vines are now growing
that will make next year's crop. They
are a sight worth driving to his farm
north of the city to behold.

Producing New Varieties.

W. W. Walker, the State-street nur-
seryman, has been working for sev-
eral years to get crosses between the
cultivated blackberry and dewberry
and the Oregon wild blackberry and
dewberry, and has some very inter-
esting results. The natives have some
delightful qualities, but are not such
producers, the blackberry being stam-
inate and pistillate on different plants
and unless growing near together do
not always fertilize. Mr. Walker has,
by inter-pollination, produced some
new varieties from seed sown by him
that promise great improvement over
anything on the market, having some
of the flavor and acidity of the wild
berry, with the greater size and pro-
ductiveness of the Lucretia dewberry
and Lawton blackberry. Such work
requires great patience and devotion,
and often the man who does the work
gets very little recognition, although
being a great public benefactor—
greater than some men who lead ar-
mies and command battleships.

The Later Strawberries.

The strawberry market is holding
up well in prices and supply of late
varieties. Among those now coming
into market are the very latest Wil-
sons, the Oregon (Hufstetter seed-
ling), and a number of new varieties
grown by E. Hofer, the Sample, Down-
ing's Bride, Kansas and Ruby. The
latter are fine canning berries, and the
Ruby will bear for at least two weeks,
and if water could be put on it would
bear for a month. The late berry and
the early berry are very profitable to
the grower, yielding from \$1.25 to
\$1.75 per crate. Among the earliest
grown here are the Clark's Seedling
(Hood River), Saunders, Oregon,
Ideal and Lloyd. Growers who want
early and late berries should watch
these matters closely, and when they
see a variety turning off early or late
berries, make a note of it, and plant
accordingly. In that way the season
can be prolonged and the industry
made more profitable.

Proposals for Supplies.

Salem, Ore., June 6, 1903.

The board of trustees of the Oregon
State Insane Asylum hereby invites
sealed proposals for furnishing the
following supplies to the institution,
for six months ending December 31,
1903: Groceries, mill feed and flour,
meats and fish, dry goods, drugs, sta-
tionery, leather and findings, boots
and shoes, plumbing, hardware, tin-
ware and tinning, crockery and glass-
ware. Lists of said supplies will be
furnished by the clerk of the board
upon application. Samples can be
seen at the asylum, and goods must be
in accordance therewith. All goods
must be in strict accordance with
sample in original packages when pos-
sible, and delivered at the State In-
sane Asylum within 20 days after the
contract is awarded, and bids must be
on blank forms, which will be fur-
nished, together with instructions to
bidders, by the clerk, upon applica-
tion. Each bid on flour or meat must
be accompanied by a certified check
of \$300, and each bid on fish by a cer-
tified check of \$75, and all other bids
by a certified check equal to 10 per
cent of the amount bid, checks of un-
successful bidders to be returned im-
mediately, and those of accepted bid-
ders when the contract is completed.
Bids must be enclosed in sealed en-
velopes, and directed to the board,
care of the clerk, and plainly marked,
"Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the
class of goods bid on should also be
inscribed on the envelope. Price, fit-
ness and quality being equal, prefer-
ence will be given to articles manu-
factured, grown or produced in this
state. When a particular article is
specifically called for, bids for any
other kind of manufacture, or brands
equally as good, will be entertained,
but to insure recognition of such bids
samples of the articles it is proposed
to supply must accompany them. The
board reserves the right to reject any
or all bids, or to accept or reject any
part of a bid. Bids will be opened at
the Capitol, at Salem, at 10 a. m.,
Wednesday, July 8, 1903.
