The Salem Carnival had the largest attendance Thursday of any day so far, and the crowds in the evening were greater than on any previous evening. All classes of citizens come out and rub against each other in the most friendly way, and with no bad results. The crowds are so large that a force of additional special police were sworn in and put on duty today and until the close of the Carnival. The confetti-throwing nonesense has led to an abuse which the managers propose to check with rigorous methods—that of throwing flowers and FLOUR—and the first person found violating the rules in this respect, and throwing anything but the finely cut paper confetti, will be arrested, and put off the grounds. The flour obtained at the "country store" has been scattered by some people at the Carnival, to the ruin of dresses, and the discomfort of the crowd.

Marriage Not Abandoned.
It was hoped by some that this would not materialize, but Mr. Arnold, who, in all other respects, conducts the cleanest show on the railroad, considers a public wedding indispensable, and offered to put up half of the \$100 purse that is held out as an inducement. If the committee in charge would raise the rest, and they have been hard at work, and it is now expected that the event will be pulled off in good shape tonight in the big tent. A very fine young couple have been found, and they say they would as soon get married there as anywhere, as they are going to marry sooner or later, anyhow, and want to take in the premium.

The Albany Carnival.
Governor Chamberlain went to Albany today to deliver an address to the Indian War Veterans, pioneers and patriots, some this afternoon, and they were invited to attend from all over Western Oregon on that occasion. Their carnival is as great a success as in any of the towns of the state, and their are usual attractions of high diving, Oriental dancing, snake charming and other forms of cruelty to animals, including the humans. There is one thing about the carnival, they get people to moving about in large

masses, put money in circulation, and increase trade of all kinds. This probably more than compensates for all the detriments.

Quite an aggregation of fake and skin-game men, who could not get licenses from the authorities in charge of the Salem carnival, have been doing time at the railroad station, saying to people arriving and departing that the Salem Carnival was a fraud and a "bum" entertainment, and that the Southern Carnival at Albany, would be here, and to wait for a good show. All such representations show that the Salem management has been on a high plane. One show set up on State street for immoral purposes, "for men only," and only lasted long enough for the Salem authorities to get their hands on one of the managers, and tell him if he didn't leave town instantly he would find himself doing time behind the bars. The Salem shows have been the cleanest and best ever presented and freest from the objectionable that usually beset even a circus.
