Governor Ships Thief

Governor Chamberlain last night honored the requisition of Governor Ferguson, of Oklahoma Territory, for the arrest of one George Hammill, wanted in Garfield county, of that territory, for horse-stealing, and the governor's warrant was delivered to Sheriff A. S. Morrison, of Garfield county, Oklahoma, for service, that officer having come to Oregon as the agent for the territory. Hammill is under arrest at Dallas, where Sheriff Ford secured him recently on the request of the Oklahoma authorities, and he has been held there subject to the wishes of the Oklahoma sheriff.

The fugitive was arrested for horse-stealing and indicted last year, being released on bail to await his trial, but fled the country, coming to Oregon, where he was recently located and arrested. Sheriff Morrison left for Dallas immediately, and will today start for his home, taking his prisoner with him for trial.

HOPS GOING DOWN

Prices Steadily Dropping Back to Old Prices

Hop prices are in reality on the downward move, and during the week just ended the record shows that several fair-sized sales have been made at prices ranging from 17 1/2 to 19 1/2 cents, with a majority of them at the lower figure. T. A. Livesley on Monday purchased from Samuel Orr, of Rickreal, 200 bales of choice 1902's at 18 cents a pound. At one time, about a week ago, Mr. Orr refused a bonafide offer of 20 cents for the same goods, and early last fall turned down an offer of 27 cents. Mr. Orr, like a large number of the valley growers, was holding for 30 cents.

Market Much Weaker.
Weakness prevails throughout the entire hop market, and it will only be the question of a few days if the present condition continues to exist before the market will touch bedrock at about 15 cents. Of course, there is always a chance that reports of crop conditions will have a rallying effect on the market, but at this time that last hope is very dim.

Contracting is very slow at present, on account of the weakness in the spot hop market, and no contracts have been reported within the past few days.
