CARNIVAL ONLY A MEMORY

The Guests are Fled and Garlands Dead

It was a Grand Success and Will be Long Remembered by all Who Enjoyed it

The Greater Salem Mid-Summer Carnival is a thing of the past, though it will long be remembered as one of the most entertaining, amusing and instructive seasons ever enjoyed by the residents of the Capital City of Oregon. Throughout last week the Carnival was liberally attended by the people of Salem and the surrounding country, but it was Saturday, the Fourth of July, that saw the large crowd of merry-makers within the Carnival enclosure, and thousands celebrated the national holiday with the Wilson avenue grounds.

At 10 o'clock, before the morning crowds had become large in the grounds, a grand parade, passing through the principal streets of Salem, was viewed by thousands. It was led by Chief of Police D. W. Gibson, mounted, followed by the band preceding Queen Agnes I. and her retinue, in carriages. These were followed by the Egyptian swordsmen and other representatives from the streets of Cairo, and the menagerie wagons of E. J. Arnold's shows, some of them open, showing splendid specimens of wild animals. The "country store" and its "Rube" hand was also there, as was the float advertising the Bancroft Optical Company.

Following the parade, the crowds moved toward the grounds, and spent the day there enjoying the big show, the "country store," the sideshows, the confetti, etc., until 11 p. m., when the scheduled pyrotechnic display took the spectators away from the circus tent to the greater glories of Fourth of July fireworks.

The display of red fire, sky-rockets, bombs and other devices to make the small boy happy, was witnessed by several thousand people. The fireworks were set off on the west end of Wilson avenue, east of the postoffice. They consisted of several hundred sky rockets and bombs, together with a set piece "Salem," the final of the display. Some of the rockets were thrown toward the Carnival grounds, and a half dozen times the tents of Arnold's shows caught fire. That gentleman at once appeared on the scene and protested against the throwing of rockets on his property, and thereafter they were sent in a different direction—where they could be controlled, which was only a part of the time, many going in the wrong direction, and keeping the spectators constantly moving to keep out of the way.

One rocket struck J. F. Wilcox, a resident of North Salem, knocking him down and burning his face and breast. Dr. F. E. Smith was at once called, as it was thought the man was

Yesterday Arnold's shows left Salem for Chehalis, Wash., where the Woodmen of the World will conduct a Carnival this week, after which Mr. Arnold will return to Portland to attend the carnival in that city, beginning July 14th.

The general committee meets Tuesday night, all bills must be presented to the committee or some member thereof before or at that time. All claims will be audited at this time and paid on Wednesday. While all expense accounts and receipts have not been gone over, the committee is satisfied that there will be funds to pay all bills promptly and in full.

The Carnival committee of the Greater Salem Commercial Club held a meeting this morning, and it was found that the receipts of the week for the committee aggregated about \$1450, while the outstanding bills will approximate about \$1300 to \$1350.

Manager Judah has the consent of Mayor Bishop to ask the city council, which meets tomorrow night, to adjourn for one week, so as to allow the committee the use of the council chamber to dispose of the Carnival business, and, as there is nothing pressing in city business, the adjournment will doubtless be consented to by the council.

He Can Talk for Either

During the recent session at Los Angeles of the Presbyterian general assembly, Rev. E. P. Hill of Portland, drew the following contrast between Oregon and California. Addressing the assembly, Rev. Hill said:

"You must not think for a moment that you have seen the entire Pacific coast when you have seen only Southern California. If I were to take you out in the country five miles from the luxuriant palm and pepper trees that line these avenues, you might be ready to listen to me sympathetically when I say that the garden spot of this coast is not in California, but yonder to the northward in the Willamette valley. The lordliest river on this continent is the Columbia to the north, and the Presbyterian city of this coast is not Los Angeles, but Portland, Oregon. You Californians must not get mad at me for saying this. Last year in New York I worked as hard as any of you to get the assembly to the coast. I told of your orange groves, your giant sequoias, and your boundless hospitality, and never said one word about your chapparal bushes, your burning scorching summer days. I was a coast man then, but I am an Oregonian tonight, and I want to say to you men from the East that you will get no adequate idea of this Pacific slope until you have seen Oregon and the country to the north."
