State Lighting Reduced.

In the state, was made at a loss, but after getting the Silverton power Mr. Henry finds the city rate profitable. On a 10-year contract he would make the city the same rate he is making the state.

Were No Other Bidders.

Mr. Hurst, of Aurora, was present, but made no bid, and the governor remarked: "Where are all these men who were going to bid for this lighting?" Echo answered nothing in the marble halls of state, and the governor said: "It looks as if we were up against it." But the only bidders who were present in person were Mr. Henry, president of the Salem company; Supt. Springer and Mr. Henry's consulting engineer, Mr. Whitted, showed no disposition to take advantage of their loneliness. They bid as hard and figured down as close as though they had all the competition in the world against them. Like the Union Traction Company, that wanted a franchise from Salem, the Hurst bid from Aurora was probably side-tracked, and at least there were no certified checks as the clock struck 11. The state board were all present, and had a friendly, pleasant conference with Mr. Henry and his staff, and asked a number of questions, that were all answered as fast as put by the engineer or Mr. Springer. Mr. Henry stated that they were bound to give the state the best service that any state in the West or East could boast of, and he believed it was in the interest of the state to take their bid for ten years, as they had discounted all possible reductions in lighting contracts, and could no lower, and make any money.

State Was Satisfied.

After answering all questions Mr. Henry and his associates retired, and the state officials expressed themselves as satisfied with the result of their labors. The net saving to the state over the old contract will be all the way from \$3000 to \$4000 a year, and in 10 years may amount to \$30,000 to \$40,000. The new rate is lower than any city is getting lights, and each building will be lighted lower than any similar private building is lighted. Mr. Henry has treated the state very well, and the state is to be congratulated on having to deal with a man who wants to do business on a large scale, and is not on the pinch or hold-up order. Mr. Henry has more than kept his promises to reduce the light bills, and the state will probably close a 10-year contract, although the board has taken the matter under advisement, having a contract for lighting at the old rate until April 1, 1904.

King Booze is Conquered

Among the pleasing features of the celebration just passed in Salem was the fact that a number of the men who have not missed getting drunk on the Fourth for 20 years did not touch whiskey this year, and went home sober and exceedingly pleased with their novel experience.
