President Loubet Kept Busy.

London July 7.—President Loubet met with a continuous ovation today from the time he left York House in the forenoon, for a visit to the French Hospital, until a late hour at night, when he emerged from Covent Garden opera house, after attending a gala performance given in his honor. Among other features of the day's program were the reception of various delegations at York House, a luncheon at Guildhall, given by the corporation of London, and a banquet at the French embassy early in the evening.

Loubet this morning visited the French hospital, and there conferred the Legion of Honor on Senior Surgeon Edmund Owen; then drove through the French colony to the French governesses' institution, where he conferred the order of the Silver Palm on Madame Ing, the superintendent. As he drove through the streets at a later hour he was escorted by the Life Guards, and given a tremendous ovation. Bells rang, crowds collected and along the line of march there were continuous roars of cheering. The Englishmen were for once enthusiastic.

Welcome to American Squadron.

Portsmouth, July 7.—The roads presented an interesting spectacle today on the occasion of the arrival of the American squadron, and the rousing welcome accorded it by the harbor ships and land batteries. The entire English Channel squadron took part in the pageant. The great warships, dressed from stem to stern, and their sides lined with their crews, boomed forth a salute as the American vessels, led by the flagship Kearsarge, steamed up the roads, past Spithead and into the harbor of Portsmouth. In the afternoon visits were exchanged by Admiral Cotton, of the American squadron, and Lord Charles Beresford, commander of the Channel fleet, and the governor of Portsmouth. Tomorrow Admiral Cotton and his officers will proceed to London, where they will be officially received by King Edward.

English Walnuts in Oregon.

(Jacksonville Sentinel.) The growing of English walnuts is coming to be an industry in Oregon for this tree bears as prolific here and has as fine flavored nuts as are grown in England. In the vicinity of Dundee, in Yamhill county, there are 27 acres of walnuts, that being the largest acreage of any other locality in Oregon. There are many English walnut trees growing in the yards of Jacksonville and the tree has proven itself a vigorous grower and a prolific bearer of very fine flavored nuts. At the price these nuts sell for in the market it would be a profitable investment to plant the hill land about Jacksonville with English walnuts, for to grow them would require no cultivation, spraying nor any of the other expense that is connected with the growing of fruit trees.
