FRUIT CROPS FAIR

Cherries Somewhat Damaged by Showery Weather

Grain and Other Standard Crops are up to Oregon's Usual High Average

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the week ending July 7th:

General Summary.
The past week has been cloudy, with frequent showers, and it was unseasonably cool. The rainfall was light in the eastern part of the state, but good rains fell in the western and southern sections. They were very beneficial to all late sown crops, such as spring grain, potatoes and corn, and they also did great good to the ranges, which have heretofore been short for the season of the year.

Many meadows are now over-ripe, and bright, warm weather is needed for haying. Some clover has been cut, and the rains have damaged it, but the amount spoiled in this way is small, as the farmers generally have put off haying until the weather becomes more settled.

The condition of wheat continues to improve. Fall wheat is ripening nicely, and the harvest will become general in about two weeks. The heads of spring wheat are of good size, and they are filling under favorable conditions. The oat crop is in even better condition than wheat. In Southern Oregon the rains came too late to help grain, and more than the usual amount will be cut for hay. Hops continue making good advancement.

Prunes and pears are unusually promising. Cherries have been badly injured by the rains. Raspberries are plentiful, and the outlook for apples is good.

Willamette Valley.
Goble, Columbia county, Frank Welter—Week favorable; some hay has been cut; cherries and strawberries ripening fast; rain did some damage to berries; garden vegetables plentiful; pasture fair; stock looks fine.

Dilley, Washington county, Wm. R. Stephens—Cool and cloudy, with showers; very little hay cut on account of constant showers; fruit is growing fast and will be a splendid crop; there will be a larger pear crop than usual.

Milwaukie, Clackamas county, R. Scott—Grain needs dry, warm weather soon or else it will not fill, as the continued wet weather has a tendency to lodge grain of all kinds; weather fine for planting kale and rape for winter feed; corn and grass doing well; cherries badly cracked.

Amity, Yamhill county, M. F. Corrigan—Week cloudy and showery, damaging hay considerably; wheat filling well, size of heads above average; indications now point to fall sown grain making nearly an average yield; oats better than at this time last year; corn needs more sunshine; some lice on hops, and aphids coming on grain; cherries considerably damaged; wild blackberries ripe, crop light.

Monmouth, Polk county, A. G. Adams—Weather cool and cloudy, with light showers; grain is headed well and the prospects are more favorable for late sown grain; green aphids have made their appearance, but have done no damage so far; clover hay is nearly all cut, and of an excellent yield; potatoes look well; fruit prospects good, especially Bartlett pears and prunes; apples will be about half a crop.

Bellfountain, Benton county, A. H. Buckingham—Weather cloudy, with cool nights and occasional showers; haying is in progress; grain of all kinds will be shorter than usual, but of good quality.

Aurora, Marion county, C. D. F. Wilson—Haying is still waiting for good weather; there is a lot of good clover that is spoiling while waiting for weather in which it can be cured; fall grain is heading and looking well; spring grain is making good growth; rain has ruined a large quantity of cherries; potatoes and hops doing nicely.

Albany, Linn county, J. W. Propst—Week favorable, but not good for curing clover; showery weather has injured the Royal Ann and Waterhouse cherries to some extent; fall sown grain is ripening; grass is still green.

Cottage Grove, Lane county, Richard Topp—Weather showery, interfering with haying; hay crop will be light; oats headed out, but not ripening yet; wheat heading; fruit good; strawberries gone; blackberries ripening; gardens good; corn fair.
