RECKLESS SEATTLE ROBBERS

Brutally Beat and Choke an Old Lady

Policeman Comes to Her Assistance and is Held up— a Fireman is Fatally Wounded

Seattle, July 7.—Three masked men entered the Palace lodging house, on Weller street, early this morning and brutally choked and robbed Mrs. E. Robinson, aged 70. Her screams attracted the attention of Policeman Norman, who entered the place, and drew his gun, but was seized from behind before he could use it. A desperate battle ensued. City Fireman Con Cunningham came to the rescue of the policeman, and was shot in the head and fatally wounded. The policeman and one robber rolled down two flights of stairs, fighting all the way. The robber was finally subdued and locked up. He gave the name of James Barton; the others escaped. Norman was also robbed of \$48. Mrs. Robinson is in a precarious condition.

New York, July 7.—Wm. O'Connor was electrocuted this afternoon for a murder committed in 1900; his accomplice, Sullivan, was electrocuted last March.

Kansas, Indiana, Missouri, Vermont, Nebraska, Michigan, Colorado, Dakota, Texas and Ohio, besides many parts of the Dominion of Canada. A crowd of at least 25,000 is counted on, of which more than 5000 will be regularly accredited delegates and the remainder visitors. Every precaution is being taken to minimize the causes of accidents, and "Smoking Prohibited," will be a conspicuous placard in the great auditorium at Piedmont Park, where the general sessions are to be held. The medical staff of the convention is completing hospital arrangements so that prompt aid may be afforded and the visitors put to no expense for emergency attendance. The auditorium and also a number of churches which are to be utilized for convention purposes are being elaborately decorated with the four colors of the Baptist Union, viz.: Green for the Southern section; Blue, west of the Mississippi river; Gold, east of the Mississippi; and red for Canada.

One of the most interesting and attractive features of the gathering will be the musical program. This is in charge of Professor Porter, of Baltimore, who has trained a grand chorus of 1000 voices, which will give a concert tomorrow night and also render selections in the interval of the convention sessions.

President John H. Chapman, of Chicago, will call the gathering to order Thursday morning and preside over the opening session. Addresses of welcome will be delivered by Governor Terrell, Mayor Howell, ex-Governor Northern and others.

Actress Tries to Break Will.

Vancouver, B. C., July 7.—The fight of Edna Wallace Hopper, the actress, for a million dollar fortune was begun here today when her suit to break the will of the late Alexander Dunsmuir, husband of Mrs. Wallace's mother and brother of the former premier of British Columbia, was called for trial. The suit has developed into a bitter contest, in which the main points to be decided is the mental condition of Alexander Dunsmuir at the time he executed the will.

The suit of the pretty young actress is for the purpose of setting aside the will on the ground of the incompetency of Dunsmuir at the time he signed it, and on the further ground that undue influence was exercised by his brother, James Dunsmuir, in securing his relative's signature. It is alleged by the contestant that at least forty days before his death Alexander Dunsmuir was not in a right frame of mind, as a result of his excessive use of intoxicants, and that while in this condition, which was frequently attended with delirium, James Dunsmuir induced his brother to sign a will at San Francisco prepared by an attorney of this city at the direction of James Dunsmuir. On the following day, it is alleged, Alexander Dunsmuir, still ill and of unsound mind, was started eastward from San Francisco. He was sick the entire trip, and when he reached Chicago it was found necessary to place him under the control of physicians, who then declared that the patient was absolutely void of reason, could not make connected sentences during his conversation and, in fact, had every symptom of a deranged mind.

The fair contestant has obtained the testimony of some of the most eminent physicians of the East and West to establish as a fact that Dunsmuir could not possibly have been of sound mind when he made his will, and to their evidence will be added that of bartenders, bellboys and others who served the millionaire with intoxicants.

Shriners at Saratoga.

Saratoga, N. Y., July 7.—The 29th annual session of the imperial council of the Ancient Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine opened here today. In accordance with custom, little business was transacted during the day, the time being devoted largely to the reception of the visitors, who arrived on every train. The South and West are particularly well represented at the present meeting. Tomorrow there will be a monster parade of the uniformed bodies, and later in the day the officers for the ensuing year will be chosen. The entertainment program is one of the best ever arranged for a meeting of the imperial council. In addition to the usual balls, banquets and receptions, there will be side trips to Mt. McGregor, Lake Champlain and other places of interest.

Weds Russian Baron.

London, July 7.—A large number of prominent Americans, resident in London, attended the wedding of Miss Francis Whitehouse, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Fitzhugh Whitehouse, of New York, and Baron Constantine de Ramsay, of Russia, which took place today in St. Peter's, Eaton Square. Immediately after the wedding breakfast and reception, the bridal couple departed for Russia, where they will make their future home, the Baron being a gentleman-of-the-chamber to the Czar.

WILL BURN OIL

Harriman Will Improve the Southern Pacific

Will Try to Cut Time From Portland to San Francisco to 27 Hours

San Francisco, July 3.—During his recent visit to California President Harriman planned improvements and innovations on his Southern Pacific system which will keep officials of the traffic and operating departments busy for many months.

One of his plans is to shorten the time between this city and Portland, and improvements to that end are now going on. Traffic officials believe that the time may be cut down half a day, and the distance covered in 27 hours.

Reconstruction Work.

On the northern mountain divisions preparations are being made for a faster schedule. Reconstruction is progressing rapidly. Curves are being reduced and grades done away with. The lighter rails which the new ones will replace are still in good condition and will be laid on the small branch roads of the system.

One step in the work of shortening time on the Northern route has just been accomplished. Arrangements are about completed for the introduction of oil as fuel on the entire California system, and the great oil tanks on the northern division are ready for use. The operating department has been engaged in effecting the abolition of coal for some time. It has involved the erection of a large number of storage tanks at different points.

Big Oil Tanks.

The great tank at Ashland, Oregon, capable of holding 55,000 barrels of oil, has just been completed, and those at Hornbrook and Edgewood, with capacities of 15,000 barrels each are practically ready for use. At Dunsmuir another 55,000 barrel tank has recently been erected. One of the largest tanks on the system is at Red Bluff with a capacity of 85,000 barrels of oil.

The company, it is said, will in the near future build oil tanks all along the line from Portland south.
