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The Pope Gradually Sinking

May Die Tonight and May Possibly Linger a Few Days

HE PREDICTS HIS DEATH WILL HAPPEN THURSDAY

Has Rallied a Little But Heart Action is Weaker and Symptoms of Dissolution Increase

Rome, July 8.—At 5:45 the Pope's condition is unchanged.

Rome, July 8.—The following bulletin was issued this morning: "The Pope passed a fairly quiet night, though he had no restful sleep. His pulse is becoming more irregular, and his respiration is not so free as it was yesterday evening. His condition does not permit a lengthy examination. The improvement in the pulmonary condition continues, but his condition is generally less easy, owing to the loss of strength, which is increasing from time to time. The development of blood poisoning means the end is inevitable. On waking this morning the Pope said: 'I wish it were all over, for I know from my vision what is waiting for me.'"

Rome, July 8.—The Pope today, in conversation with Mgr. Angeli, one of his attendants, said: "I am sorry I can't be present at tomorrow's service, because tomorrow I shall die." Early in the afternoon he had another fainting

It became more and more apparent as the morning advanced that the improvement in the Pope's condition, noted after the operation yesterday, has not been maintained. The heart action has become more feeble, and the doctors are reluctantly compelled to admit his condition is critical. Notwithstanding his serious condition, His Holiness insisted on being carried from his bed to the reclining chair about noon. He was able to converse with the doctors and intimate attendants. A telegram has been sent to Dr. Cardarelli, the well-known Naples specialist, calling him to attend a consultation at the Vatican tomorrow. The Pope continues to take a little nourishment today. It was announced from the Vatican this afternoon that His Holiness' temperature varies from

97 to 98 degrees. Telegrams have been frequently received today from almost all the European rulers.

Rome, July 8.—Symptoms of blood poisoning have appeared in the Pope, and it is now stated at the Vatican that it depends entirely on the progress of the dread symptoms whether His Holiness will last days or merely hours. The physicians in attendance hold out but little hope, as notwithstanding the amelioration in the symptoms it is simply impossible for the organism of the pontiff to have the energy necessary to eliminate the toxic affection which has presented such grave symptoms. The pleural liquid doesn't seem to be regathering, but His Holiness' general condition is not so tranquil, and his depression greater. When Dr. Mazzoni visited him this morning, His Holiness complained of feeling worse than yesterday, adding: "Therefore, I can't work as I wish to." Mazzoni states the cyanosis of the Pope's fingers is spreading over the hands.

Paris, July 8.—A special from Rome to the Patrie, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, says the Pope's condition is desperate. It is now known he must die, and the end is expected tonight or tomorrow at the latest.

Rome, July 8.—The composer Perosi visited the Vatican today, and afterwards left for the country. This would indicate the Pope's illness had taken a more favorable turn, because Perosi, as director of music in the Sixtine chapel, would have to participate in the ceremony following Leo's death.

Vienna, July 8.—The Tageblatt today prints a rumor to the effect that, in view of Rampolla's hostility to the triple alliance, Austria would exercise

her right of veto should he be elected Pope.

Washington, July 8.—The papal legation received the following from Rampolla this morning: "The state of the Holy Father continues grave today."

Rome, July 8.—The cardinals are beginning to criticize Lippini for not seeing the real state of the Pope's

health long ago, and are now insisting that the highest medical authorities in the world be called into consultation.

Rome, July 8.—The physician's bulletin at 8:30 this evening says the pleura and lungs are satisfactory, but His Holiness is experiencing difficulty in urination. There has been no attack of weakness today. The pulse is less frequent, breathing calm and general conditions better.

UTAH GRAND JURY

Says it Can Find no Polygamy in Utah

Mrs Blaine is Dying

Augusta, Me., July 8.—Mrs. James G. Blaine, widow of the statesman, is dying of old age, and can live, at most, but a few days.

Can Only Pay Small Percent

New York, July 8.—Leroy Dresser, whose recent failure caused a sensation, was unable to meet his promises to pay in full. His creditors will probably receive about 25 per cent.

Secretary Hay Nothing to Say

Oyster Bay, July 8.—Secretary Hay concluded his conference with the President, and left for New York today. He had nothing to say regarding his visit.

Postponed His Visit

Berlin, July 8.—The Kaiser has postponed his Scandinavian tour owing to the Pope's illness. The moment death occurs he will hasten to Rome to attend the funeral.

Boycotting the Telephone

Spokane, July 8.—The Trades Council, the central body of the organized labor of Spokane, have placed the telephone company on the unfair list, and ordered a general boycott, on account of its attitude toward the striking operators. The girls are canvassing the city securing signatures to removal orders. They expect to secure the removal of half the phones in the city.

American Tars Eat Roast Beef

Portsmouth, Eng., July 8.—Lunch was tendered 800 American sailors today. The streets were densely packed and profusely decorated. The Kearsarge band headed the parade. Admiral Cotton and a number of officers went to London this morning, to attend a banquet given them by the First Lord of the Admiralty.

The Christian Herald, of New York, has contributed another \$10,000 for the relief of the famine district in China.

Negro Brown Ordered Returned for Trial

Town is Full of Troops and no More Serious Trouble is Now Anticipated

Evansville, Ind., July 8.—Everything is quiet here today, no crowds have gathered, and the excitement is dying out. It is thought there will be no further trouble.

After several consultations last night and this morning, Judge Basch decided to order the negro, Brown, the slayer of Policeman Massey, and the cause of the recent rioting, returned to this city for trial. This is to be done tonight, if the negro is able to travel. He will be arraigned Thursday. No trouble is anticipated, as the great display of troops is considered sufficient to deter the rioters.

Studebaker Wagons Burned

San Francisco, July 8.—The Studebaker wagon depository was partially burned at 2:30 this morning; loss, \$200,000.

Italians Have a Scrap

Glens Falls, N. Y., July 8.—The Italian workmen on the new dam had a free fight today, in which nine were wounded, two probably fatally.

Russia Gets More Cannon

Birmingham, Eng., July 8.—The Post states that Russia has ordered 50 heavy guns and 25 creosote guns from Krupp, for the fort at Port Arthur, also 10,000 60 rounds of ammunition.

Run of Salmon Increases.

Astoria, Or., July 8.—The run of salmon has shown a marked improvement yesterday and today, and some good catches are being made. The fish are large and of exceptionally fine quality. As the seining grounds are nearly all in operation now, and many of the traps are beginning to fish, the deliveries at the canneries have been greatly increased. The fight between the Columbia River Packers Association and Lindenberg for steelheads did not last long, as soon after it started the fish became plentiful, and both plants received more of them than they could handle. The price has now dropped back to 3 and 4 cents a pound at the different points on the river.

Dynamite Discovered in Cellar.

London, July 8.—The Morning Advertiser publishes a dispatch from Constantinople, saying the police there have discovered in the Bulgarian quarter a large quantity of dynamite concealed in a cellar. The owners escaped, but a Greek was found in the cellar stabbed to the heart. It is rumored, adds the dispatch, that the Bulgarian committee intended to blow up the residence of one of the foreign

Russia is Preparing For Contest

Prominent Officials in Secret Conference

DO NOT CARE FOR JAPAN IF SHE FIGHTS ALONE

Russian Company has Purchased Steamship Lines From British, Acting for Government

Kinchau, China, July 8.—All the prominent Russian officials in China, Manchuria and Korea are attending a secret conference now in progress at Port Arthur. It is generally believed they are considering the war question. The present Russian policy, it is believed, is to hold New Chwang, and take no steps to avert hostility with Japan, if assured the latter will fight

unaided. The war feeling among the Japanese of North China is intensifying. A Russian company yesterday completed the purchase of the river steam tug business from the British company. The new company is apparently acting in behalf of the Russian government, all vessels are re-commanded by Russian officers, and with crews composed of Russian sailors.
