Fourth of July Accidents

Disfigurement, death and fire were the grim companions of the Fourth of July patriot. Dispatches to the Record-Herald, of Chicago, give a total of 36 killed and 1093 injured, as a result of the day's celebration. The number of fatalities exceeded those of last year, when 21 gave up their lives during the observance of the day, and 2172 were reported injured. The list of injured, however, this year, is far from complete, and may have exceeded the large total recorded in 1932.

But one person is as yet known to have been killed in Chicago, but 70 were injured, most of them by the accidental discharge of fireworks.

Quarrying Rock for Jetties. Astoria, Or., July 8.—The Northwest Construction Company has about 200 men employed at its Quincy quarry, and nearly 100 tons of rock are being shipped each day to the jetty at the mouth of the river. Within a month the new quarry at Bugby will be in full operation, and 300 men will be at work there. The very latest and most improved machinery is being installed in order to handle the rock in the most rapid manner possible.

Preparations are now being made for an immense blast, that is expected to loosen thousands of tons of rock. A number of tunnels, some of them over 500 feet in length, are being run into the mountain, and when the blast is made, several tons of powder will be exploded.

Some Notes From Alaska

A letter was received by County Clerk Clinton Monday from his brother, Will Clinton, that contains several items of interest to Astorians. The letter is dated May 16th, and was written from Chena, which is located at the lower end of Bates rapids, on the Tanana river, Alaska. Regarding the camp the writer says that it is the worst he has struck since he has been in the North. No one has any money or gold dust, and nothing has been found on any of the creeks as yet. Provisions are very high and scarce, but plenty of them were expected within a short time. Mr. Clinton says he is engaged in whipsawing lumber, and has 1000 feet, on which he will realize a profit of \$200. Nearly every one will leave there for Nome as soon as possible, but he intends to stay for awhile.—Astoria Budget.

Fires Cut the Wires. Seattle, July 8.—A special dispatch to the Post-Intelligencer from Dawson states that the last link of the United States government telegraph system connecting St. Michael with Seattle has been connected, but vast forest fires have interrupted communication. Miles of telegraph poles have been burned in the wilderness through which the line runs. The fire region begins about 50 miles south of Fairbanks.

It is also announced that the first through steamer from St. Michael arrived at Dawson today. The Alaskan congressional committee is due tomorrow.

Board of Trustees Let Contracts for Asylum Supplies

E. C. Cross Secures Contract for Fresh, and Hartley and Eoff for Cured Meats

The state board of trustees for the insane asylum opened the bids for supplies for the next six months, at a special meeting held this forenoon. There were a large number of bids, and many bidders were in attendance. As nearly all bids were made on single items, it will be a week before the awards can be made. The meat contract was awarded at once, E. C. Cross securing the contract for fresh meats, and Hartley & Eoff on hams and bacon. Mr. Cross' bid on beef was \$4.60 per 100 pounds, and \$4.50 for mutton. Hartley & Eoff will furnish hams at 13 1/2 cents a pound; breakfast bacon at 14 cents, and heavy bacon at 12 1/2 cents. The sugar contract was awarded to Allen & Lewis, of Portland, whose bid went through Harritt & Lawrence, of this city.
