FISH WARDEN'S REPORT

Will Erect Big Hatchery on Snake River

Several Offenders Arrested for Violating the Fishing Laws, Discharged on Paying Costs

The state board of fish commissioners held the regular monthly meeting at the state house yesterday afternoon, and Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen was in attendance and submitted his report for the month of June, showing the arrests for the month for violations of the fisheries laws, the collections of license fees and the expenditures of funds. The fish warden submitted to the commissioners the plans for a new salmon hatchery at Ontario, on the Snake river, and reported that he had asked for bids for the construction of the plant, and that proposals were now coming in. The contract for the erection of the new structures will be let at an early date, and the hatchery equipped for the season's work immediately. Mr. Van Dusen says that this new hatchery will be the most complete and the largest in the United States, and probably in the world.

The report of the collections for the month shows the receipt of \$3203.50 for licenses in the first district, and \$67 in the second district, while \$33.35 was received from John Rian, the net proceeds of a fine of \$50 imposed on him for fishing in the Columbia without a license, making a total of \$3303.85 in receipts for the month. The disbursements of the month aggregated \$5150.04, expended for account of the several funds, as follows:

The report of the prosecution of violators of the fishing laws shows a number of arrests made by the deputy wardens, and several of these offenders were convicted and fined.

The patients brought were: Sam Foster, A. W. Randall, August Holm, and Charles O. Metson, and they were all committed from Southern Alaska. Marshal Shoupe was accompanied by Deputies P. E. Kelly, J. J. Clarke, A. N. Stephenson and R. B. McKay. The party left Juneau last Friday evening, arriving in this city on last evening's train. Mr. Shoupe said he had no trouble with his charges on the way down, but was glad to have them off his hands, as they were all large, powerful fellows, and might have become very troublesome. This installment of patients brings the number sent here from Alaska up to 25.

These are some of the ninety-six conditions named in the contract under which Patti is to come to the United States next winter: For sixty concerts she will receive \$5000 per concert and one-half the gross receipts above \$7500; on the steamer Patti is to have seven rooms for herself and husband, and rooms for her seven servants, twenty-one dogs, an Angora goat, and fifty birds. For land travel special trains must be engaged. At every performance the songstress must receive at least three floral pieces or laurel wreaths. The cheapest seats must not be below \$3. Patti selects her own hotel at the manager's cost and her reception room must not be less than \$50 a day. Her private cooks must have access to the hotel kitchen. The manager must also furnish two-horse carriages night and day. The program must be in three numbers only, two songs and one operatic part. Patti may sing more, but must not be asked to do so. She agrees to go anywhere in the United States except New Orleans.
