WANT MORE WAGES

A Thousand Miners Delegates Meet in Pittsburg

Represent 50,000 Miners and Will Demand Increased Pay and Set Date for Strike

Pittsburg, Pa., July 8.—A thousand delegates, representing 50,000 miners in Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, and Texas, met here today in convention to arrange a demand for increased wages, or set a date for a strike. Mitchell arrives tonight.

Portland Leads World

Portland lumber manufacturers for the first six months of the current year have shipped more lumber than has been shipped from any other port in the world. Since January 1, 1903, there has been shipped from that city, foreign and coastwise by water, and by rail East and South, over 165,000,000 feet of lumber. This vast amount was sent out from Portland alone, and does not include shipments by water from St. Helens, Rainier, Westport, Astoria, Knappton, Vancouver and other Columbia river points. During this period there has been a very heavy local demand, conservative estimates placing it at 250,000 feet per day. From this it is apparent that the Portland mills have cut for shipment and local demand since January 1st over 200,000,000 feet of lumber. The rail trade is a natural accompaniment of the cargo trade, and accordingly has expanded as the water shipments have increased.

BULL CALF CASE

Both Parties Claim the Gentleman Bovine

Justice Hogah Reading up on Solomon and Studying the Methods of Lyncurgus

In the justice court for Salem district, at 10 o'clock Thursday morning, the case of F. Goffin, plaintiff, vs. L. L. and Mary Aral, defendants, will be called for trial. The action is brought to secure possession of a 2-year-old bull calf, which plaintiff alleges defendants took from his place on June 9th, after breaking down plaintiff's fence and a gate, and later marked one of the ears of the calf and sawed off its horns. The defendants claim ownership of the calf, and the fight for possession of the animal promises to be a warm one. Plaintiff asks for \$50, the value of the animal, if the latter cannot be secured, and in addition for \$50 damages. H. J. Binger is attorney for the plaintiff, and P. H. D'Arcy will appear for the defense. The case will probably be tried before a jury, to be drawn by Justice of the Peace Horgan.

Now up to Roosevelt

Governor Dole, of Hawaii, has sent an inquiry to Washington regarding the action necessary by President Roosevelt in approving the bond issue by the territory. The legislature has provided for an issue of bonds for over \$2,000,000 for public improvements. The organic act requires that the territory may issue bonds only with the approval of the President of the United States. It is a question whether this means the approval of the bond act or the signing of each bond. The governor has asked for a cable answer and the President's approval, in order that the work may begin here at once on the issue.

The resignation of Henry E. Cooper, as superintendent of public works, has been withdrawn. A joint resolution asking him to withdraw it was passed by both house and senate. The house passed a resolution asking Cooper to call for the resignation of Marston Campbell, assistant superintendent of public works.

The United States tug Iroquois has returned from Midway Island, where she went to assist in the cable laying. While there Captain Rodman, of the Iroquois twice drove away parties of Japanese, who were on Sand Island hunting birds. He has asked Governor Dole to issue a proclamation prohibiting the killing of birds on any of the islands between here and Midway, including that island.

At present the only government at Midway is that of the navy. It is held, however, that Hawaii has jurisdiction, and that the government has power to issue a proclamation preventing the Japanese from continuing their depredations.

Island Trade is Growing

Washington, July 8.—Official returns as to the commercial conditions in the Philippines show our trade with the archipelago is steadily increasing, and now amounts to more than a million and a half monthly.

JUNE TERM ENDED

Judge Burnett Cleans up the Docket Today

July Term Begins Monday With Several Jury Trials to be Heard—Today's Business

Judge Burnett, in the circuit court yesterday afternoon heard testimony in the case of the Bank of Woodburn vs. Jim Tong, defendant, H. E. Cole being the garnishee. The case was tried before the judge, submitted and taken under advisement. At 1 o'clock this afternoon the court reconvened, when Judge Burnett gave judgment for the garnishees, dismissing the proceedings as against the garnishees, with costs and disbursements.

In the case of P. L. Frazier and J. M. Long vs. Western Union Telegraph Company, an action for damages, the court gave the defendants leave to answer, as prayed for.

The court made the following docket entries in cases pending:

State of Oregon vs. Fred Williams and Peter Adams, criminal; dismissed by district attorney.

Thomas Gibson, vs. Mary Gibson, et al., action for money; motion to strike out parts of reply sustained as to first specification, and otherwise overruled.

F. W. Strayer, plaintiff, vs. W. Hayden, defendant, and F. I. Dunbar, garnishee, action for money; default and judgment against defendant.

At 2 o'clock the court adjourned the June term sine die. The July term will begin next Monday at 9 a. m., when a number of jury trials will be held.

An appeal was filed this afternoon in the circuit court, in the case of Joseph Lemmons, by B. F. Bonham, guardian ad litem, vs. Stephen Huber, recently tried in the justice court. The action was brought to recover \$31.50, alleged to be due on a quantity of hay wrongfully taken by defendant. The case was tried March 16, 1903, when the defense secured a non-suit and judgment for costs, and plaintiff appeals. Bonham & Martin are attorneys for the plaintiff.
