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The Weather.

The weather forecast for tonight and Friday is fair.

LIFE IS NOT MATERIAL.

There is much in the recent experience of the Pope to bear out the cardinal contention of the Christian Scientists, that life is not material.

In defiance of all predictions to the contrary, the Pope rallied again and again, and even rose from his so-called death bed and performed important functions.

Dr. Mazzoni is quoted as saying that the Pope's organism is abnormally strong, "which can do miracles. Science," meaning material science, "can do nothing more for him."

The Pope insists on working and walking, and kept saying the best remedy for weakness was activity, and strongest of all, as the physicians remarked symptoms of increasing weakness, the Pope resolutely grew stronger.

The Pope tells his physicians that he knows all they do for him is out of affection for him, but he says if his last day is approaching, as they declare, he must employ all the time he has left to the best advantage.

The truth is the Pope relies on a higher power than material aid—he has a firm hold on spiritual truth, and has repeatedly demonstrated it over the claims of age, and the edicts of the medical profession.

While his attendants have been surprised at his "unnatural" power of resistance over death, the Pope has proven that it is only natural to live on while there is work for him to perform.

Those who declare that because he is in the nineties, therefore, he has but few days to live, may voice what is called a natural decree, but they proceed on the mistaken hypothesis that life is material. The Pope rests his belief on the knowledge that his life is from God, and that so long as he is about his father's business, to use the expression of our Saviour, the claims of death and disease will be set aside.

MAKE IT A CONTINUOUS HARVEST.

The cherry, raspberry and Logan berry season will keep the cannery in operation for another month. But there is need of a crop of cannery fruit for August and September.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club should investigate this hiatus in the fruit harvest and see if it cannot be overcome, and make the summer a continuous harvest of small fruit.

The strawberry has made great progress as a cannery fruit. In no other section are so many strawberries grown direct for the cannery as at Salem, and the Union has had the effect to double the acreage.

But there is a month or six weeks before hop picking that must be supplied with a berry harvest to furnish employment for the pickers, and to keep the cannery, with its hundreds of employees running constantly.

The Commercial Club should hold a conference with Manager Holcomb, of the cannery, and with fruit growers and nurseries, and let us get at the facts of the case, and take steps to supply the missing month's work.

Blackberrying of the improved variety will produce ten thousand pounds to the acre. Allowing half a cent a box for picking, even at the present low prices, they would net the grower \$175 per acre.

A continuous harvest would be a blessing to the business man, as well as to the families who pick berries and to the cannery. It would add materially to the prosperity of the small fruit grower.

The time is past when there is a long dull season for the business man in summer. The short time now open

can be filled with a crop that will close the gap, and no better work could engage the Push Club.

A large acreage of blackberries would stimulate the establishment of another cannery industry at Salem. One industry helps establish another. The berry industry requires no bonus, but figures show it is profitable.

STATE FAIR NEXT

Board Gets Everything in First Class Shape

Meeting This Fall Promises to Eclipse all Former Events in Attractions and Attendance

The members of the state fair board, who spent the past few days in this city, looking over the grounds at the race track, and among the stock stalls, left last evening for their homes, well pleased with the progress being made in the matter of repairing the old buildings at the fair grounds, and the erection of new structures. The board is expending \$1000 in repairing the old cattle and horse stalls, and reshingling them, and they will be placed in better condition than they have been in many years. The grand stand at the race track is also undergoing extensive repairs, getting a concrete foundation, and receiving an all-round overhauling. The foundation of the grand stand was in poor condition last year, and there was danger of a collapse if crowded, as was the case last season, when 10,000 people found seats in it on a single day. A new amphitheatre is also to be constructed, in which will be held the fine stock sales, and which will be provided with raised seats to accommodate 800 spectators. The sales to be conducted in this place will be the largest ever known on the fair grounds, and will include only pure bred livestock. Every animal consigned to this sale will be registered, and up to the standard in individual merit, and the sales will greatly increase the standing of Oregon as a producer of fine stock.

Applications for space for exhibits are rolling in at a rapid rate, and there are now sufficient of these to fill every available space, and more room will have to be provided to accommodate intending exhibitors. The exhibits in every department promise to be far better than in past years, putting in the shade all past efforts in that line.

Many fine horses are at the track in training for the races, and excellent work is being done by both runners and harness horses. In order to increase the interest in the track events, the board is negotiating with the owner of Crescenzo, the famous trotting stallion of Cleveland, O., to give an exhibition mile every day during the fair. That famous horse has a record of 2:02 1/4, and, as he can secure no more match races, owing to his wonderful speed, he can now only be used for breeding purposes, and to give exhibition work at race meets. In case the board should secure him for this year's fair the track record, as well as that of the Pacific coast, will surely be broken; besides, there is a possibility, in case the weather and track conditions are favorable, that the great trotter may lower his own wonderful record, a thing not out of reason. In view of the fact that Lone Oak track is one of the fastest in the United States, barring only the kite-shaped tracks on the grand circuit.

The Lobster's Enemies.

"The lobster," said an old fisherman "has no greater enemy than the bottom feeding fish—blackfish, codfish, haddock, and so on. They eat the lobster entire when they find one that has just shed its shell, when it is not only soft, but powerless, and they may disable a lobster and then destroy it even when it is in fighting trim. Half a dozen blackfish, for instance, might come across a lobster and manage to bite off its legs and so partially disable it."

"The lobster is agile, a quick and long jumper through the water, but the blackfish is quicker and can easily keep up; and, the lobster finally disabled, it quickly finishes it. In this way a blackfish might get away with a lobster of considerable size. The codfish gets many—very likely the cod knows the haunts of the lobster better than men do. The skate, clumsy as it is, gets some; if it can blanket a lobster, got one of its big flap-like pectoral fins over it, the skate gradually works the lobster up to its mouth and holds it so while it eats it. The skate gets crabs in the same manner, and there is a fish called a crab eater. In fact, there is constant warfare going on at the bottom of the sea among the dwellers there in the struggle for existence, and the lobster among them has no greater enemy than the bottom feeding fishes."
