More Awards are Made

The board of trustees for the asylum has awarded contracts for supplies as per bids received on Wednesday. The award of the meat contracts was given in The Journal of Wednesday evening. The hardware and tinware contract was awarded to Gray Bros., at \$130.87, and the same firm secured the tinning contract at \$133.28, while R. M. Wade & Co. will fill the hardware list for \$225.21. The plumbing supplies will be furnished by M. J. Petzel for \$57.75, and the Portland Fish Company secured the contract for fish at from 6 to 8½ cents per pound.

Superintendent James, of the penitentiary also opened bids for supplies the firm of Steusloff Brothers securing the beef contract at \$5.25 per 100 pounds. Bids for other supplies are now under consideration, and awards will be made sometime tomorrow.
