Looking into Criminal CasesHas Been Notified an Attempt
will be Made to Get
Peacock Sentence
Commuted

District Attorney Hart is in the city to prepare for the July term of the circuit court, which convenes Monday morning. He is today investigating the case of S. B. Hoeringhaas, the man who was bound over to the circuit court by City Recorder Judah, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. Hoeringhaas drew a check on Ladd & Tilton, bankers, Portland, for \$25, payable to himself, and this check he endorsed and passed on J. Conner, proprietor of the Willamette Hotel, who cashed it for him. The check was found to be worthless, and was returned by the Portland bankers, with the endorsement, "No account." Mr. Hart is investigating the case, with a view to filing an information against the man, charging him with the crime of obtaining money by false pretenses, and the case will probably be tried next week. Hoeringhaas has a brother in New York City, who is a prominent attorney, and his family is said to be wealthy.

Mr. Hart has been served with notice by Attorney Oscar Hayter, of Dallas, that an effort will be made next week, before Governor Chamberlain, to secure a commutation of the sentence of W. P. Peacock, recently convicted of murder in the first degree, and now in the penitentiary, awaiting execution, set for August 7th. The attorneys for the defendant have probably abandoned the idea of an appeal to the supreme court, and their efforts will now be directed toward saving the man's life by securing a commutation of the death sentence, and they base
