# WEALTH OF THE POPE

Said to be Something Over Five Millions

The Treasures of the Vatican Palace are However Considered as Absolutely Priceless

New York, July 11.—The World says: The statement cabled from Rome that Pope Leo has willed his private fortune, not to relatives, but as a private fund for his successor, arouses interest in the extent of the Pontiff's fortune. It is said that the amount will probably exceed \$5,000,000. It is on deposit at the Bank of England.

The Pope has many relatives, but has never used his position to enrich or advance them. When he became Pope he told his relatives that this would be his course.

The Pope regards as his private fortune only that which has come to him in gifts. He keeps a separate account of the different revenues, such as "Peter's pence" and real estate and bonded investments. He spends over \$1,000,000 of church money for charity annually, and has built up, out of the official funds, a contingent fund of \$30,000,000. Personally, the Pope has never been parsimonious, but has encouraged literature and art, and financially assisted friends. He once lent the Banca di Roma 1,000,000 lire to save it from disaster, and also lent great landed proprietors \$400,000 to tide over an emergency. While the Vatican treasures are practically the Pope's personal property, by inheritance from his predecessors, none of them has ever asserted anything but stewardship over them.

The Vatican palace, with its 7000 rooms is a storehouse of priceless treasures of art, literature and precious examples of the jeweler's and goldsmith's art. It is said to contain more gold than the Klondike, more jewels than the diamond mines of South Africa. When Leo celebrated the golden jubilee of his priesthood he was given \$3,000,000 in coin.

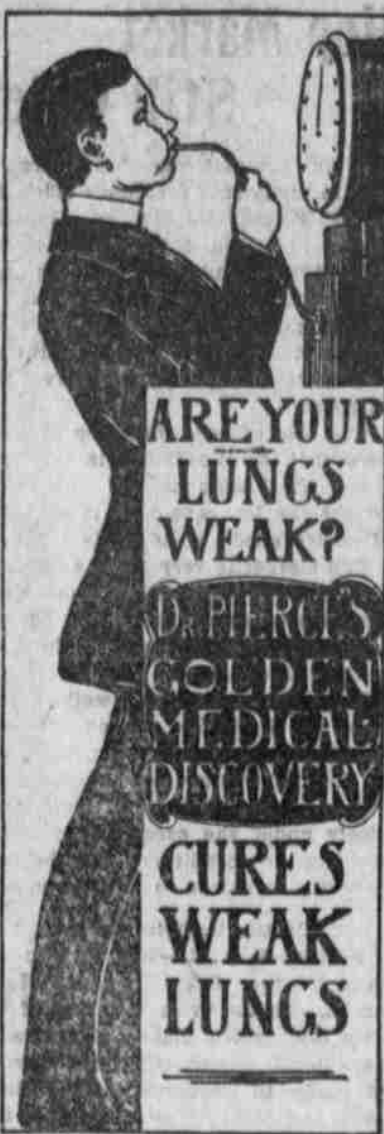

## No Longer a Mystery

The circumstances surrounding the disappearance of little Garnet McCready the afternoon of July 1st are no longer a mystery. The belief, entertained by nearly everyone, that she slept beneath the placid surface of the old Willamette has been proved to be correct, by the finding of her body yesterday morning about 1 o'clock.

Four young men, Milton and E. A. Mills, Chester Zumwalt and Ed. McCready, brother of the missing child, were patrolling the river near a gravel bar, opposite the Swick home, below the sawmill. Knowing that the body was apt to come to the surface on the ninth day, the purpose of the child's relatives was to keep a constant watch, night and day, until Friday. The Mills boys were in one boat, while Zumwalt and McCready were in another. The night was cold, and they began racing about 1 o'clock to "warm up." Suddenly M. A. Mills saw an object floating about three rods from the west shore, and investigation proved it to be the body of little Garnet. It was placed in one of the boats and brought to the ferry landing. Coroner Wilkins was summoned, and he had the corpse conveyed to his undertaking parlors.

The funeral took place from Wilkins' undertaking parlors yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. F. L. Moore. Interment was had at Crystal Lake cemetery.—Corvallis Gazette.
