HOPS STILL QUIET

Cold, Bad Beer Weather one of the Causes

Crop Prospects Have Improved Though it is Conceded the Average will not be Reached

The local hop market continues very quiet, and, though some few deals are being closed, by which growers dispose of their holdings, there is very little encouragement in the prices quoted for a higher market. Orders are scarce, dealers being unable to secure them at figures that will make it possible to fill them from Oregon stocks, and in consequence there is very little doing in the local hop circles. Some of the dealers have, during the past few days, tried to secure orders from London houses, but thus far without results. The Gilbert & Patterson crop, from their Lincoln yard—the firm's interest in the crop—amounting to 43 bales, was yesterday taken in by B. O. Schucking, who purchased the lot at 18 1/2 cents. This was a choice lot of hops, and earlier in the season commanded a big price. A. J. Ray, of Portland, has the remaining hop crops at Sherwood, three lots, aggregating 118 bales, at 15 cents.

Crop prospects for this year continue very good, and especially promising are the reports from England and the Continent. Every day brings reports of the improvement in the yards everywhere, and the outlook is indeed favorable. The Oregon yards are showing decided improvement, especially those on the higher lands, while those on the low lands, which were reported as having suffered

much, are coming out nicely. E. C. Herren reports his yard, south of Salem, in splendid conditions, and estimates his crop this year will be 20 per cent. larger than was that of last season from the same acreage.

In a letter to The Journal, concerning the prospects for the hop crop, Chas. May & Co., hop merchants, of Albany, N. Y., say of the conditions in that state:

"As far as our New York state crop is concerned, we can say that, under the influence of good hot, forcing weather for the past week, our crop prospects have improved very much, and, while we will not have a large crop, still indications point at this time to about 60,000 bales; at the same time we wish to say that all estimates at as early a date as this are merely guess work."

"As far as our market is concerned, we can report it very dull, with a declining tendency, caused mainly by the poor beer weather that we had last month, and the consequent absence of demand from brewers up to this date."

"As yet there is no authentic information at hand as to the prospects of the English crop; vermin was reported there some time ago, but, under the influence of the fine weather they have had for the past week or so, there is no doubt but what conditions have vastly improved. The reports from the Continent up to this time have been very favorable."

Linn County Report.

A representative of Faber & Nies, hop dealers and brewers, Albany, estimates that there will be a 70,000-bale crop for 1933. He says in the yards visited there is not much vermin, and that the condition of the crop, as to quantity, has improved. He does not believe lice will afflict the crop much, but advises all growers who have some lice now to spray before the crop blooms. The vines have made unusually long arms, and this insures a bigger crop. The missing hills are not going to cut the crop down so much as was expected, as there is always a percentage of missing hills. He does not look for any advance, but further declines, as the early hops in England will be in market by August 20th, and it takes longer than that to get hops across the water at present. The prospects for a growers' pool he does not consider very flattering. So long as hops will sell for 15 to 16 cents, there is no pool needed to save the grower, and only an unexpected failure in England or Germany will send up prices.

To be successful a pool must be formed by at least two-thirds of the growers on the Pacific coast before the hops are in a bale. A small pool of 5000 bales will not perceptibly affect the market. A larger pool would control the situation, if the pool would engage one firm to sell, and make no consignments. It should employ an expert grader, appoint a committee on appeals, and divide profits on all hops sold above a minimum price. Hops that they tried to buy a week ago at 17 1/2 cents are now offered them at 17 cents, with a downward tendency of prices. A joke is told on Mills, of Gervais, who bet \$20 with a dealer that the crop of 1932 would not be over 85,000 bales in Oregon. The \$40 was in the hands of a stakeholder, and on his request the money was surrendered to Mills some months ago, on condition that if later returns sent the crop above 85,000 bales he was to return it. Now the figures send the crop up to 87,000 bales, and Mills will be asked to refund the \$40.

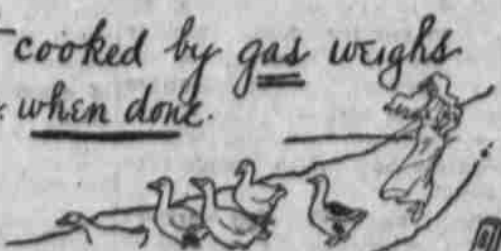
