LIKES OREGON CLIMATE

Mr. Charles Canfield the Los Angeles Oil Magnate

Visits Salem and Thinks it the Best Thing he Ever Struck Outside of Oil

Charles Canfield, of Los Angeles, California, one of the original discoverers of oil in that city and state, is in Salem on a visit to friends and relatives. He is accompanied by his family, and is making a tour of the Northwest, and before his return he will visit Alaska.

Mr. Canfield, who has been a miner and prospector all his life, made a fortune when he struck oil in Los Angeles ten years ago, but, though that was the foundation of a fortune now requiring seven figures to properly express, he is not now interested in Los Angeles oil-producing properties, but he has heavy interests in other oil fields in California, Wyoming and Old Mexico, and is now prospecting the reported oil discoveries in Alaska.

With his partner, Mr. Canfield controls nearly 500,000 acres of oil lands on the east coast of Old Mexico, near Tampico Bay, and there they have expended about \$400,000 for machinery and other development and improvement work, and they are now producing and refining 1000 barrels per day of oil, with good prospects of multiplying this output many times in a short space of time. The lands purchased by them in Mexico are mostly on the old Spanish grants, and Mr. Canfield considers their titles to land far more secure than in the United States, for the reason that the government protects titles, and there is far less likelihood of unscrupulous people contesting them on technicalities, as is often done in the oil regions of California.

He stated to a Journal reporter yesterday that one tract of land purchased by his firm, 180,000 acres, was a part of one of the Spanish land grants made in Mexico, and that, when the abstract was made, it was found that the tract had not been transferred for 170 years.

Mr. Canfield is a member of the firm of Chance & Canfield, of San Francisco. They are heavily interested in a number of banking and other institutions throughout California, and are heavy stockholders in a number of oil companies operating in that state. One of these companies alone putting out 18,000 barrels of oil per day. They have men in Alaska investigating the oil fields there, and are keeping their eyes open for oil discoveries in other parts of the Pacific coast.

Mr. Canfield and family, while in Salem, visited with Messrs. Manning & Ferguson and A. H. Schafer and their families, relatives of the visitors, and today the parties leave for Portland, Puget Sound and British Columbia, and will visit Alaska before returning south.

Penitentiary Statistics

Supt. James, of the penitentiary, last evening filed his quarterly report with Secretary of State Dunbar, showing the earnings of the prison for the three months of the new administration, the expenditures and the general statistics of the prison population are shown in full, from which we compile the following:

At the beginning of the last quarter there were 317 convicts. There were received during the quarter 32, discharged 40, escaped 1, died 1, sent to asylum 1, leaving at present 306. The earnings were \$4642.92, and the total expenditures, including betterment of the institution, \$14,052.45.

Wade & Co. will furnish the hardware and M. J. Petzel has the contract for engineers' supplies.

S. A. Pease, manager of the Jefferson Flouring mills, was in the city today, and filed his company's bond as warehouseman in the sum of \$12,000, which is the heaviest bond of its kind required in the country.
