The Weather.

The weather forecast for tonight and Thursday is fair.

A SANITARY MEASURE

The necessity for the extension of the old city limits to take in the suburbs grows out of the fact that without such extension of the boundaries there is no sanitation of the city possible.

All will admit that sewers built to the present city limits would not provide sewerage for about two-thirds of the territory occupied by the city and suburbs, and some of these suburbs are thickly built up as portions of the older part of the city within the limits.

A sewer system for the whole city, including the suburbs is a sanitary necessity.

Such a sewer system should be built to accommodate the city and suburbs—the city as it will stand twenty years hence.

Not a street or sidewalk or bicycle path can be properly laid out and constructed without taking into consideration those parts of the city now in the suburbs but which will be part of Greater Salem on October 1st.

The two water courses that now run through the city cannot be kept clean unless the city acquires jurisdiction over them.

Those water courses are now used by many citizens for sewerage waste, and this polluted water is drunk by hundreds of cows and the milk is poisoned thereby.

These water courses should be rendered absolutely clean and free from pollution of any kind, if we are to have a healthy city and suburbs.

Water courses running with clean, pure water, as these would be if they were not polluted by sewerage, would be a blessing to man and beast.

The proposition to bring a suit to enjoin the Greater Salem charter from going into effect is in reality a greater menace to the welfare of the city than anything that has been attempted of late years.

Greater Salem is a necessary moral and sanitary step for a clean and a safe residence city and a wholesome capital of the state.

NEW STATE CHAIRMAN.

The Republican State Central committee met at Portland July 13 to choose a new state chairman, "Jack" Matthews having resigned.

It is probably necessary to do this as any political organization must have a head to it or it will go to pieces.

Oregon is so strongly Republican that under all ordinary circumstances the Republican party will be called upon to furnish officials.

It is very important that the state machine of the dominant party be managed by a clean, capable and competent man.

At present when Oregon is trying to get into the front rank of western states it is important that the chairman be a man of prominence.

He should above all things be a man who is in harmony with the Oregon delegation at Washington.

A chairman should be able to command the stenews of war for campaign expenses and should be able to enlist the best speakers in the state.

It is more than likely that the next Republican state convention will reject the state chairman who is now put into power, if he is the right kind of a man.

On the other hand it is somewhat doubtful if any man chosen by a Portland faction at present will be endorsed by the state convention.

One thing is certain, "Jack" Matthews will be succeeded by a new man and one who will probably harmonize the party better than he did.

NEWPORT GETTING GAYER

Big Excursion Sunday and the Crowds are Increasing

How People Live by the Seaside—Harvest of Good Things at Low Tide

Newport, July 14.—(Editorial Correspondence.) Well, here we are again, for the annual outing by the seaside, at Bay View, Olsson's addition, where the breezes are soft even when there is a three-day northwester on, curling the sand over the dunes on north beach, and lashing the breakers into foam that dampens the light dresses, takes the kink out of the tightest frizzes and browns the most sea-worthy complexion. Capt. Olsson always has a few cottages on his hands to accommodate family parties, and Mrs. Olsson has some neat and cozy rooms with a veranda overlooking the bay and harbor mouth. Her garden always has plenty of old-fashioned flowers, and the ranchers bring milk and honey, tender and juicy vegetables and raspberries and blackberries, dewberries and strawberries, from their hill farms. The usual colony is at this corner of the swell seaside resort, where there are two hot salt water baths and two beaches for surf bathing, and the bay gets warm when the tides are high at mid-day, and the children paddle in the warm salt water on the sand beach that is forming in front of Olssonville.

Rich Table Supplies.

The bay has still inexhaustible stores of fish, and a boating party will go out half a day and often return with seventy to a hundred pounds of flounder, perch, kelp and cod. Crabs are got at early morning at low tide with a garden rake. Clams in three or four varieties can be had for the digging. Among the early risers the other morning to learn the mystery of capturing the juicy bivalve that requires neither pepper nor salt to be eaten, was Mrs. Dr. Williamson of Salem. Crab spearing is a popular sport, next to eating them, while rock oysters can be gathered any morning the black rock is visible at low tide in front of Indian Anne's wigwam. These table delicacies to be appreciated at their real value have to appear on a metropolitan bill of fare where they range from 50 cents to \$1.25 per dish. Here they are in reach of all who have a little industry or cash.

The Talking Spring

Still bubbles and chatters as it falls merrily down to the tide. The first day some kind person had tied a tin cup by a string to one of the blooming salal bushes that hang over this enchanted fountain by the walk that leads up the bay, but next day it was gone. Now an old tomato can does service and the water is just as cool and sweet as though quaffed from a silver goblet. It has still the magical power to make the bashful youth grow eloquent and few pairs of wandering lovers can pass the talking spring without slaking their thirst and at least making their eyes express what their lips refuse to utter. A few throwish maidens after leading their admirers to this fountain a few times grow impatient and at least one emptied a can of the cold fluid down the back of her "feller's" neck and he did find sounds to utter. The usual dancing parties are on for the season and they are finer and more orderly conducted than ever at the opera house.

River and Bay Beautiful.

The Yaquina river is now most beautiful. Its blue-black waters reflect the inverted mountains and its banks are gay with the white and purple pinnles of foxglove, while the crimson flowers of the elkweed shine through the silvery foliage. On the river and bay say fishing and pleasure parties are the rule by day and by night. During July and August the

harvest moon adds enjoyment with its brilliant illumination. The full tides at night, with harbor lights and bonfires on shore, the bay resembles fairyland.

Newport Easy of Access.

Transportation facilities make Newport the most enjoyable of seaside resorts. Leave Salem at 11 a. m. wait 50 minutes at Albany, and at 5:25 you are at Yaquina, the head of the bay. The train crew are all old experienced hands, and Supt. Edwin Stone is a born master caterer to the public in providing safety and comfort. The Western Transportation Company, of which M. M. Davis is president, operates the solid passenger schooner Richardson between Yaquina and Newport, with Capt. Royal A. Bensell in the pilot house. A pleasant and refreshing voyage lands the passenger at Newport.

Good Hotel Accommodations.

The hotel accommodations at Newport are better than ever. Mrs. Case and daughters have their usual summer guests at the large and restful Ocean house. Mr. and Mrs. Abby have so long entertained the public well they never lack for guests. Sam Irvine at Nye Creek, looks after the comforts of people so well he is always full. The old Bay View house has an energetic new management—Jacobson & Fogarty. Capt. Jacobson was for seven years in the life saving service, and has for a partner Jack Fogarty, a son of John Fogarty. They have a reputation to make for hospitality and will prove unremitting in their attentions.

How People Live.

How do we live? Well, besides the hotels mentioned there are boarding houses, aplenty, and rates very reasonable. First-class board and room from \$1 to \$1.25 a day, even at good hotels, is cheap considering the delicacies one gets. Fresh salt water fish, crabs, clams, oysters, rock oysters, vegetables and fruits in abundance are on all the tables. There are still plenty of cottages to be had at from \$20 to \$50 for the season, according to location and furnishings. A one or two room cottage, to cook and eat in, with a tent for sleeping, is a popular combination.

Tenting is Lovely.

I prefer to sleep in a tent at the ocean. All talk about the dampness of the night air may be discounted. I have for years carried a typewriter to the seaside, and my tent opens on the bay, not a hundred feet from the farthest reach of high tide, and the machine has not grown rusty. My tent floor is of red clover, with coltsfoot blooming all around the beds. By night the roaring surf of the ocean tulls to slumber, by day the droning bumblebee makes it easy to take an afternoon nap. The table is supplied with the latest books and magazines, while the sideboard is not without the customary provisions of hospitality and civilization.
