CRIME IN PORTLAND.

The numerous hold-ups and robberies in the city of Portland are advertising that city to the world as a pretty tough place.

People up in the country begin to feel that it is a good town to keep away from over night, and will make their visits by daylight.

There is not much credit coming to the Williams administration from the carnival of crime that seems to be holding high level in Portland.

Probably not much blame lies at Mayor Williams's door, as he is conducting just such an administration as he was put in there to conduct.

The city police department, with a force of detectives, the sheriff and his deputies, and the constables and their official force number about a hundred men.

Many of these perform merely clerical duties, and are not expected to make arrests and look after criminals. But the cry of a very small police force does not answer all the criticism.

Partisan rule is not to be objected to when the object of partisanship is to secure good administration, rather than serve the machine.

Of course, the great moral wave of righteousness that sent the Williams administration into power was worse than a fake.

The immoral elements were with the dominant party, and always have been at Portland.

The bifurcated charter and the civil service provisions about how tall a policeman shall be to get an appointment are all rot.

Gambling and all vice is wide open at Portland, and the civil service system puts marionettes, and not men, into office nine times out of ten.

The simple truth is the city government of Portland is not conducted for the benefit of the taxpayer, or the protection of the city.

The Williams administration of the city of Portland is for the benefit of the officeholders, and for the protection of the criminals.

That is the true purpose of nine tenths of the partisan city government.

A business program that shall stand for good government, and for no partnership with vice and crime, would not be possible at Portland.

Dear old Father Williams was expected to be putty in the hands of the Jack Matthews machine, and he has offered no resistance.

The Spadocoe literary inventions interjected into the charter will do to waste at the public for their deception, but they do not supply executive ability and honest administration.

There are no political factions at Portland that do not ply the graft, and there are no politicians there who are not after the "stuff," pure and simple.

Portland has not yet awakened to the necessity of municipal decency, and it is doubtful if any city of that size can be awakened with ordinary partisan methods.

The Portland newspapers that are crying out and feebly spluttering about the era of crime have their hands in the sack as deep as any of the politicians.

Until local government is conducted for the sake of the government, and not for the sack and plunder, there will be no great change, and the citizen should protect himself against crime in politics, as well as crime on the highway.

GREATER SALEM AND LABOR. The little town of Forest Grove is erecting fifty or sixty good buildings. Salem should be building two hundred new houses.

What is this city doing as a city to promote its own growth and development?

What policies are being pursued to bring about an era of rapid and permanent improvement and constant growth?

Besides what the farmers and fruit growers do to make Salem a busy place, are we, as a city, doing anything?

Instead of bringing a lawsuit to enjoin the going into effect of the Greater Salem charter, our leading citizens should be united in every policy that will promote growth and development in a reasonable and healthy manner. Every man and woman who lives in the city, and those who will be taken into the city October 1st, should not

rest satisfied until this city is making a more rapid growth.
The city and its new additions must have an adequate sewer system that will insure good sanitation for rich and poor. This may cost \$100,000, but must be done.

The two running streams that course through the city summer and winter should be properly restrained and purified, and not be made open sewers and cesspools to poison the air and pollute the milk of cows.

There should be streets and bicycle paths opened through from the old city to the outer limits of the new city. That will make it an object to reside in the suburbs, and will make all suburban property valuable.

The building of these streets, of a proper sewer system and of enclosing and purifying our water courses, and sidewalks and crosswalks, and bicycle paths will employ labor.

Before two years are up the city of Salem should adopt such policies as will result in these improvements on a large scale.

Nothing but the employment of common labor, mechanics and teamsters will make the city grow rapidly.

The expense of such improvements will come largely out of dead property that is lying idle and keeping its owners poor paying taxes on it.

A thousand to two thousand laborers on the payrolls for two years would result in five hundred or a thousand homes being built in the suburbs, and in the doubling up of the value of all suburban property, and in the sale of it to home builders.

The labor organizations of this city, and all men who want employment, should stand for such constructive policies as will make Salem a good town for a working man, and then it will be a good town for everybody.

There are those who will be shocked at these propositions, but they are mostly persons who are naturally opposed to all improvement and all progress.

Greater Salem will be prosperous and progressive, and property will become valuable only as policies are pursued that lead to labor on a large scale.

Once the work is begun, and the impetus given to improvement, nothing can stop this city becoming one of the best on the whole coast.

Nothing but an aggressive policy in the interest of labor will make it such a city as it should become. The opposite policy of indifference will leave it a dead town, dragging along by the heels for the next ten or twenty years.

A Chapter
of Accidents

Mrs. Sarah A. Gerow, an attendant at the Oregon insane asylum, met with a most distressing accident yesterday afternoon, while driving on the Turner road near the reform school, and the result of her accident may be serious.

Mrs. Gerow's horse became frightened and shied into the ditch alongside the road, throwing her out of the buggy. Not content with the damage already done, the horse reared, and, losing its balance, fell over on the unfortunate lady, crushing her to the ground. Help was at once available, and she was taken to the asylum, where Dr. J. F. Calbreath attended her injuries, and these were found to be severe. Her collar-bone was broken on both sides, and two ribs on the left side were fractured, while she sustained a number of severe bruises. She is receiving the best of care, and Dr. Calbreath thinks that no bad effects will result from the injuries, beyond a season of forced inactivity.

D. A. Yoder, who operates a wood saw in this city, lost two fingers yesterday while operating the saw in the rear of the Haines tailor shop. Mr. Yoder was in the act of cleaning up a pile of wood, and was placing the last sticks of the rick on the saw, when the swiftly revolving disc caught the index and middle fingers of his left hand, and neatly amputated them at the first joint. The injuries were at once dressed, and beyond the loss of the fingers, there will be no serious results.

Ned Gamble, a son of former Police Officer Gamble, met with a distressing accident last evening at the planing mill of Brown & Layman. The young man was operating a joiner, a large machine he has had charge of for some time, when his left hand was caught in the machinery, and his third finger severed at the joint, and the balance of the hand was severely bruised and lacerated. Medical attendance was at once secured, but this morning the patient complained of severe pains, and a further examination of the wounded hand will be made today, with a view to giving the young man the required relief.

OREGON
TO HAVE
NEW LINE

Harriman to Build
Roads Through
Oregon

Cuts off 200 Miles, and will
Also Build a Line From
Pocatello Into
Harney

Boise City, Idaho, July 16.—Idaho and Oregon soon will enter on an era of railroad building of great importance. The Harriman interests are preparing to construct a line, 500 miles long, from Red Rock, Mont., through this city and westward until the Deschutes river is reached, thence down that river to the Columbia, to The Dalles, where the new line will strike the Oregon Railway and Navigation lines, and thence to Portland. The cutoff will amount to nearly 200 miles. Another line 200 miles long will reach from Pocatello southwest into a country heretofore without railroad communication.
