MEXICO HONORS JAUREZ

Birthday of Soldier Who Conquered Maximilian

Orations Delivered and Tomb Buried Beneath the Mass of Floral Offerings

City of Mexico, July 18.—This was the birthday anniversary of the liberal party president, Benito Juarez, and in honor of his memory appropriate memorial exercises were held in the cemetery of San Ferdinand. A long procession marched to the cemetery where lie the remains of the illustrious soldier who led the successful struggles against the Maximilian empire. The procession included workmen's societies, members of the federal district and city governments, scientific societies, officers of the militia, members of congress and members of the liberal patriotic committees. Orations were delivered by prominent public men and at the conclusion of the exercises the tomb was almost buried beneath the floral offerings of the different societies and Masonic lodges.

Theodore Ware, a laborer employed in the Wood & Sheldon Lumber Company's camps, near Sisson, met with a horrible death Saturday night. Ware was employed in the logging camps, and Saturday night, when he went to bed in his cabin at Rainbow camp, he was considerably under the influence of liquor. About an hour after he had retired a fire broke out in the cabin, and Ware, being rendered helpless by the liquor he had imbibed, was unable to get out of the burning cabin until he had received burns that proved fatal. His neck and chest were horribly burned, and he inhaled considerable flame. He was taken to Sisson and given medical treatment, but died Sunday afternoon. 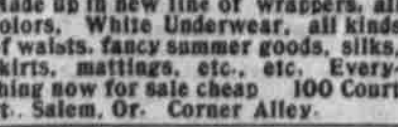
