WILL OPINION STAND

Lawyers Think Portland Judges are Mistaken

Layman Suggests that Multnomah Should Hold Civil Service Examinations for its Judgeships

There has been considerable discussion of the decision of the Judges in the fourth judicial district, holding that the initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution was not legally adopted, and that it was therefore no part of the constitution of this state, and the friends of direct legislation are chagrined at the turn affairs have taken in that connection. That the case will be appealed to the court of last resort for a decision is generally expected, and the question now is, will the supreme court uphold the lower tribunal, declare the amendment legally adopted, and, therefore, not adopted at all?

The Portland judges, in discussing the case, take the ground that the equal suffrage amendment, introduced in the legislature at the session of 1895, for the first time submitted for the second time to the legislature of 1899, before being submitted to the people for their votes, was pending when the initiative and referendum amendment was voted on for the first time in the legislature of 1899, and, under the provisions of the constitution, that no amendment can be proposed when another amendment is pending, they hold that the last named amendment was not legally proposed, and, therefore, void. They further hold that the legislature of 1899 was the first one legally elected after the equal suffrage amendment was proposed in 1895; that the legislature of 1897 was not chosen within the meaning of the law; in fact, that no legislature was chosen in 1896, and that, therefore, the equal suffrage amendment proposed in 1895 was referred to the next legislature chosen, that of 1899, and was pending when the initiative and referendum amendment was proposed, making any action taken on the last named amendment null and void.

eminent attorneys, who have carefully studied this phase of the case, in this city disagree with the able jurists who decided this case in Portland, and they express their belief, freely that when the question comes before the supreme court a reversal is almost certain on this point. That the legislature did not organize in 1897 is, of course, conceded, but that did not invalidate the election held in 1896, and they hold that the legislature was chosen, and legally chosen, within the meaning of the constitution. The members were all elected, met at the capitol, and the senate organized and transacted business, while the house, after perfecting a temporary organization, proceeded no farther, and while it is true that the pending amendment could not be submitted to the legislature, the legislature was still legally elected, and the amendment died, as under the peculiar circumstances existing it was not voted on by "the legislative assembly chosen at the next general election" held after the 1895 amendment was first passed. Authorities have been consulted on this question of choosing or electing officers, and all of them agree that the election is complete as soon as the votes are cast, and that no subsequent organization or other act is necessary to complete the election. A few of the definitions of the word "chosen" may not be amiss here.

In Cook vs. South Park Commission, 61 Illinois, the supreme court of that state says: "To choose signifies to take one thing rather than another," and holds that the words "chosen" and "elect" are synonymous.

The American and English Encyclopedia of Law gives the definition of the word "choose" to "make choice of, to select, to take away by way of preference two or more things offered, to elect."

An authority directly in point on the sufficiency of the election may be quoted here to support the contention that the legislature of 1896 was "chosen" long before the members met in Salem for organization. In State vs. Hunt, 54 New Hampshire, p. 431, the supreme court of that state says: "When a person dies after he has been chosen a county officer, though he has the authority to declare the office vacant, and fill the vacancy."

Under these authorities lawyers here, who have studied the question, hold that the position of the Portland judges, that the legislature of 1897 was not "chosen," and that after 1895 the first one "chosen" was that of 1899, elected in 1898, is erroneous, and that the equal suffrage amendment was dead in 1899, when the initiative and referendum amendment was proposed, and that no amendment was pending.

The Register says: Eugene put Salem on the shut-out list yesterday by a bona fide score of 4 to 0. It was one of the most exciting contests of the season, and a big crowd was there to jolly the locals to victory. Somers was in the game with those winning slants up his sleeve. Very few visitors got the big entree to the third sack, but when they did, the big fellow would settle down and strike his men out.
