## Policemen Have a Job

New York, July 20.—Only by drawing their revolvers and threatening to shoot to kill, did several Brooklyn policemen prevent a mob from wrecking vengeance on Frederick Kriemeyer, after he had shot his wife and his step-daughter. Up to the doors of the Hamburg-avenue police station the clamoring mob went crying, "Lynch him!" and it was necessary to call out the reserve. Kriemeyer was so badly beaten before the policemen rescued him that it was necessary to call an ambulance.

Although he is 40 years old, Kriemeyer was driven to the shooting by jealousy of his wife, whom he married three years ago, and who is now 34 years old.

**Run of Salmon Improving.**  
Astoria, Or., July 20.—The run of salmon continues to improve, and all classes of gear are making good catches, the gillnetters doing especially well last night. While none of the plants have been blocked, all the cold-storage plants are working overtime to handle the fish turned over to them. The canneries are, however, not so crowded. Schmidt Bros and J. Lindenberg, who have been paying 7 cents per pound for the large or cold-storage fish, dropped the price this morning to 6 cents. One middle river canner, who has no cold-storage plant, is reported to be paying only 5 cents today for all sizes of fish.

**Strained Up By Fair Case.**  
Paris, July 20.—The papers devote considerable space to the fair case, the arrest of Frenchmen on a charge brought by foreigners having aroused a certain amount of chauvinistic feeling. Le Journal publishes a fresh interview with Mme. Hourdet, who, with her husband, continue to assert that they did not see any bicyclist on the day of the accident. A new feature of the case is the Hourdet's assertion that two cyclists stopped before the house on the day following the accident and looked in through a window of the room where the corpses were lying, one remarking: "That is fair; I knew him well in Paris."

Hourdet says the description of the accused Frenchmen corresponds with these men. His wife, however, is less affirmative.

Another point which has been brought out is that the Hourdets are dissatisfied with the sum of \$15,000 given by Mr. Vanderbilt and Mr. Oelrichs for their cares in connection with the accident.

### The Pope Conquered by Death

nobles were desperate and hopeless. His wonderful executive ability and firmness soon brought order and peace, and in 1841 he was made governor of Perugia.

In 1843 he was recognized Archbishop of Damietta, and was sent as Apostolic Nuncio to Brussels. He returned to Rome in 1845 on the occasion of the death of Pope Gregory, though not on account of it.

He was made Archbishop of Perugia, and entered the city to take possession of his See in 1846. In 1852 he was made Cardinal, taking his title from St. Chrysogonus, and for 24 years the Cardinal Archbishop kept his pastoral charge in Perugia. In 1877 he accepted the office of Cardinal of Camerlengo to Pius IX.

When on February 7, 1878, Pope Pius the ninth passed away, it became the duty of the Camerlengo to render the last office, to close the eyes, to prove the death according to the ancient and solemn formula, and to preside at the magnificent obsequies.

Immediately following the solemn Requiem for Pius IX, the conclave assembled in the Sistine Chapel for the purpose of electing his successor. The oaths were administered at half past three in the afternoon of February 18th, there being a greater number of Cardinals present than on any other occasion on record. He was elected on the third ballot, the first being void through an error, by a vote of 44 out of 62. He chose the title of Leo XIII, in memory of Leo XII for whom he had a profound veneration. On March 2d the coronation took place; Cardinal Merello placing the jeweled tiara on the head of the new Pontiff. Of the 25 years of his pontificate but recently completed space forbids even a brief resume. Of him Cardinal Newman in 1880 said: "It is not decorous to praise the living; it is not modest to panegyric those whom one should obey; but in the successor of Pius, I recognize a depth of thought, a tenderness of heart, a winning simplicity, a power answering to his name, which keeps me from lamenting that Pope Pius is no longer here." The Catholic church mourns today the loss of one of its grandest characters, and the whole Christian world gives its meed of sympathy.

## Just the Same Everywhere

Washington, July 20.—Gen. Wood, by an act of the Philippine commission, a copy of which was received by the war department today, has been given almost supreme authority over the island of Mindanao, and made both military and civil governor of the Moro province. He is empowered to appoint all subordinates in the civil branch. He may suspend or dismiss any district official. The Philippine government is seriously considering the adoption of one of Miles' plans, in spite of its rejection by Roosevelt and Root. A bill has been drawn which gives the superintendent of the educational department authority to hold competitive examinations, and secure 100 students to be sent to the United States. They are to be educated at the expense of the Insular government.

## Fever is Dying Out

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 20.—The lynching fever is dying at Thompson. No further trouble is anticipated. The sheriff arrived with the alleged murderer, Jim McCloud, after an all-night ride, at 7 o'clock this morning, accompanied by state troops. He will continue his journey to the Basin today. Walters and Gorman, who were killed by the mob yesterday, were buried in the potter's field today.

**All Around Ireland.**  
London, July 20.—The official programme of the visit of King Edward and Queen Alexandra to Ireland shows that it is the intention of the royal couple to circumnavigate the island; set foot on all four provinces, and stop at the principal towns of each. The festivities at Dublin will continue until next Saturday, when their majesties will visit Lord Londonderry at Mount Stewart.
