

WORK FOR A PARDON

Lee Welch Sent up From Roseburg a Year Ago

Friends Think He has Been Punished Enough and are Taking Steps to Secure His Pardon

The friends of Lee Welch, who is serving a three-year term in the penitentiary for statutory rape, from Douglas county, are circulating a petition for his pardon, which is being signed quite numerously. The petition will be presented to Governor Chamberlain, and a strong fight made to secure his release. Welch formerly lived in Salem, where he bore a good reputation, and he has many friends here. Two years ago he went to Roseburg to work on the new court house, and while there fell in with a girl whom he lived with at a boarding house. Introducing her as his wife, until the girl's relatives caused his arrest on the charges of which he was later convicted. The relatives proving that the girl was under 18 years old, though already a mother before she met Welch, and he was convicted and sentenced to prison for three years, his term beginning January 26, 1902.

Both reports were approved. A liquor license was granted Felix La Branche, and requests were received from J. P. Rogers for three license renewals.

Mr. Poble asked for further time by the fire and water committee to report on fire cisterns in Yew Park.

Mr. Geddings, who has purchased the old postoffice building, asked permission to construct a corrugated iron shed at the rear of his building. Granted.

F. A. Sutton reported that he had received injuries by a fall from the bridge on 12th street in Yew Park, and asked that he be reimbursed in the sum of about \$75. Referred to committee on ways and means.

The new park board reported that it had organized by electing William Brown president and Mrs. Fry secretary.

The street commissioner was ordered to build a cement sidewalk in front of the Geo. H. Jones property on Commercial street, between Leslie and Bellevue streets, and that the recorder make the necessary entries.

A petition from the postoffice employees asking that the proposed bicycle ordinance be not passed, and that paths be built before sidewalks were withdrawn from use by bicycles, was read.

A remonstrance was also read by bicycle riders opposed to excluding wheels from 12th street, signed by many residents of Yew Park.

Fire Chief Johnson recommended the appointment of two new hosemen, Chas. West, vice Fred Kurz, and Chas. Wright vice J. W. Galbraith. Approved.

A remonstrance from the drivers of hacks, express wagons, drays, etc., was read objecting to the proposed license ordinance relating to the tax imposed upon them. Referred to ordinance committee with instructions to report at the next session of the council.

Upon motion the entire new license ordinance was re-referred for revision. Authority was given the ordinance committee to have the city hall roof painted.

An ordinance authorizing the S. P. Co. to put in a switch on Trade street, at the Tillson-Bartlett warehouse, was read the first and second times and referred.

The substitute bicycle ordinance was read the third time. Councilman Hubbard moved that the ordinance be laid upon the table. Seconded by Larsen. The mayor ruled this motion out of order. Councilman Stolz then made a plea for the new ordinance, claiming that it is fair to all classes. Hubbard spoke against the ordinance as being unfair. Larsen stated that he was opposed to the ordinance, because it provided no avenue of travel. He said he would favor it as soon as paths were provided for. Mr. Stolz stated that these gentlemen were erroneously wrong in their conclusions, when the vote was taken with the following results:
