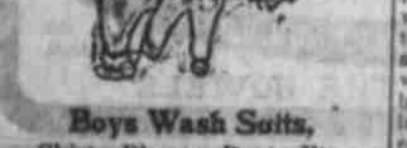

SALEM'S HORSE HEAVEN

Cuitan Restaurant is Now Ready to Transact Business

Simpson's New Barn Completed and Prepared to Care for Beast or Machine

Salem is fast putting on metropolitan airs, and the business men of this city are rapidly outstripping those of other cities on the coast in the equipment provided for their patrons. The latest improvement—for an improvement it is, of which the city may be justly proud—is the new livery barn on High street, opposite the court house, now nearly completed, and which was especially erected for J. A. Simpson, the Court-street liveryman. The building is the property of E. S. Lamport, the commercial-street harness dealer.

The new barn is a splendid structure, 60 feet front and 120 feet deep, and is one of the best and most complete erected in the Northwest. The walls are of brick, with a metal front and roof. But it is the interior arrangement that will catch the fancy of all who see it. The front shows two large double doors, and between these is situated the office, furnished like a modern business office, and immediately in the rear of this is a comfortably furnished waiting room for ladies. A lady attendant will be stationed in the office, and will attend the telephone, and wait on any ladies who may visit the barn on business. The waiting room is supplied with all modern conveniences, mirrors, etc. Immediately back of the ladies' waiting room is the carriage room, taking up the entire width of the barn, and running back 40 feet, and divided from the horse stalls in the rear by a solid wall and heavy doors. Between the carriage room and the rear one side of the barn contains a harness room, supplied with all modern conveniences, and a 100-gallon tank for hot water being among the fixtures, the whole connected with the sewer system of the city. structure is divided up into box stalls, and will be used for boarders exclusively. The stalls are large and roomy, and the upper portions of the partitions are of heavy wire netting, thus permitting the free circulation of air with the perfect security of the solid box stall. The south half of this portion of the barn is for the use of Mr. Simpson's own teams. The stalls are open, and, as on the other side, the upper portion of the partitions are wire netting.

On the east wall of the harness room is an innovation, one not dreamed of by citizens of Salem as a possibility in a livery barn here for many years to come. It consists of 15 lockers, where patrons of the barn may leave any article they desire, securely under lock and key. Here the fastidious gentleman may leave his rifle when going for a drive; here he may leave any article of horse equipment when not in use, and be assured that they will not be used by any one during his absence, as he and the proprietor of the barn are the only persons having keys.

Over the office, on the second floor of the building, are the quarters of the employees, two large and comfortably furnished bedrooms, with carpeted floor and home-like furnishings, large windows and all modern sanitary arrangements, and between the two sleeping rooms is a large sitting or lounging room, to be elegantly furnished and made as home-like as possible, and such will be the arrangement for the comfort of the men that there will be no excuse for them to loaf about the saloons to spend their leisure time. The men's comfort is further provided for by the installation of a modern bath room on the ground floor, and this, like all other portions of this most complete and neatly arranged barn, is supplied with hot and cold water, and the most sanitary arrangements.

In the rear of the men's private quarters, on the second floor, are the hay-mows, with a large hay carrier, and later Mr. Simpson proposes to install an elevator by means of which to elevate ricks to the second floor, and make room on the ground floor for more vehicles when the increased space is needed.

In front of the barn a 14-foot cement sidewalk and cement approaches give easy access to the carriage room, and the water pipes, gas pipes and electric wires enter the barn under this walk. The barn is thoroughly piped for water and gas and is wired for electricity, and may well be called a model livery barn. It is in the style of automobile barns now becoming so popular in the large Eastern cities, all the arrangements being on so elaborate a scale and so complete with a view to the comfort and convenience of the patrons, that Salem needs may well be proud of this new addition to the city's business enterprises.

Bikes Must Quit

(Continued from first page.)

Section 5. It is hereby made unlawful for any person, or persons, to ride any bicycle or tandem-wheel upon any sidewalk of the city of Salem, Oregon, at a greater rate of speed than eight miles per hour, or 702 feet per minute; save, and except, when passing pedestrians, when the speed aforesaid shall not exceed four miles an hour, or 351 feet per minute.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, to ride a bicycle or tandem-wheel upon any sidewalk of the city of Salem, Oregon, at night, and after the public lights of the said city are lighted for public service, without having attached to said bicycle or wheel, a well-lighted

lamp for the purposes of illumination. Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, to ride a bicycle or tandem-wheel upon any sidewalk of the city of Salem, Oregon, without having said bicycle, or wheel, in firm and regular control by proper grip upon the handle bars thereof.

Section 8. It is hereby made unlawful for any person or persons to stand or lodge a bicycle, a tandem-wheel, a motorcycle or a go-cart against the front of any store or business house or public building, or against the show window of any such store, house or building within the city of Salem, Oregon, nor lodge any such cycle, wheel or cart within the public entrance, hall way or stairway of such store, house or building in said city, as aforesaid. And all racks placed upon the sidewalks of the city of Salem, Oregon, for the use and convenience of riders of bicycles or tandem-wheels must be placed upon the outer edge of the sidewalk, and shall not occupy more than two feet of sidewalk space, measuring from the outer edge of said sidewalk, and all racks now in use and service in this city shall be made to conform to the dimensions herein prescribed.

Section 9. Any person, or persons, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, before the recorder of said city, be fined in a sum not less than \$5, nor greater than \$50, and the city marshal is hereby empowered to take and hold the bicycle, tandem-wheel, motorcycle or go-cart ridden or used by any person, or persons, so violating any of the provisions hereof, pending the payment into the hands of the recorder of any fine imposed under the terms of this ordinance.

Section 10. All persons exercising the functions of a policeman in the service of the city of Salem, Oregon, whether on regular or special duty, and whether on salary or without pay, shall have power and authority, and shall make arrests under this ordinance, and it is hereby made the duty of the recorder to report to the common council of said city, from time to time, the names of all officers making arrests hereunder, together with the list of the fines imposed in the case of each arrest, and the council shall, at its subsequent meeting, order warrants to issue in favor of the arresting officers so reported for one-half the sum of the fine imposed and reported by the recorder as aforesaid, in each particular case.

Section 11. Ordinance No. 382 of Salem, Oregon, entitled "An ordinance to regulate the use of unicycles, bicycles, tricycles and tandems on the sidewalks of the city of Salem, Oregon," and ordinance No. 388 of said city, amendatory of said ordinance No. 382, aforesaid; all ordinances of said city enacted prior to the passage of said ordinances Nos. 382 and 388, aforesaid, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 12. This ordinance shall not be operative nor of effect until 30 days from and after its approval by the mayor of the city of Salem, Oregon.
