The superintendents of schools of Crook and Washington counties have filed their annual reports, from which the following is compiled:

Crook County.
Total number enumerated, 1397; number pupils enrolled, 818; number under 6 years of age enrolled, 31; teachers employed, 61; number of children not attending school, 237; whole number of days' attendance, 55,244; average daily attendance, 498; districts in the county, 44; legal voters in the county, 1046; books in the school libraries, 383; new books bought, 166; cash receipts, \$21,969.94; expenditures, \$14,704.14; value of all school property, \$17,723; insurance, \$2430; average salaries paid monthly to male teachers, \$51.60; female, \$44.07. There are two deaf mute children in the county, Andrew Hamer, aged 16, and Chas. Cox, aged 20, both of Crook.

The Sheriff Cuts the Walk

An execution was issued last evening, instructing Sheriff Colbath to deliver to G. D. Trotter, the strip of land sued for by him recently, and claimed by the town of Stayton. Deputy Sheriff J. L. Skipton at once went to Stayton, and proceeded to saw off the portion of the sidewalk. The strip of land is described as 12 inches wide along the north end, and 6 1/2 inches wide along the east side of the north half of lots Nos. 5 and 6, in block No. 3, in the town of Stayton. The mayor objected to the proceedings when Mr. Skipton began his work, but no objections were offered to the carrying into effect of the court's order.

Got Well Soaked

Fred Fisher, the 8-year-old son of C. J. Fisher, was almost drowned while swimming with a crowd of small boys in a mill pond above town, last Saturday afternoon. While running back and forth on the apron of the dam he lost his footing and slipped down the incline into the deep pool below. His young companions were unable to rescue him from his perilous position, but their lusty cries for help attracted the attention of Frank Rowell, who happened along on his way home west of town. By this time the Fisher boy had sunk out of sight for the third time.

Mr. Rowell lost no time in reaching the point of the dam where the boy went to the bottom, dove head foremost into the water, and brought the boy to the surface and then to the bank. The little fellow appeared to be lifeless, but prompt measures were taken to resuscitate him, and after rolling him around, standing him on his head, and getting a couple of gallons of water out of him, he was taken home, none the worse for wear, apparently.

It is a decidedly good thing for a boy to learn how to swim, especially in this state, where there are so many streams, but when deep water is resorted to by small boys, a grown person and a good swimmer should be one of the party. Brave men, like Frank Rowell, do not happen around every time somebody's white-haired parent is flying the distress flag.—Polk County Observer.

New Kind of Wheat

D. C. Cole, one of our substantial farmers, residing six miles west of Eugene, brought to the office, says the Eugene Register, a sample of wheat of the giant variety, measuring 6 feet, 7 inches high, some of the heads measuring 5 1/2 inches in length, and are well filled with plump grains.

This is said to be a new variety of wheat for this country, and was sent to Mr. Cole from Nebraska by his sister. This variety does not grow as large in Nebraska as it does here, proving that churning soil very often increases the yield and productiveness. It is suggested that if some of our farmers would send East and get some red oats and try them in Willamette soil, the soil might prove of great productive power.
