Statistics Also Show Teachers Wages Much Higher in Eastern Oregon Counties

Two reports of county superintendents were filed in the department of education, at the state house, this morning. These are those sent in by the superintendents of the Morrow and Malheur county schools, and the following statistics are taken from the reports:

Total enrollment in the schools, 1246; enrollment of children under 14 years, 24; teachers employed, 75; children not attending any school, 225; white children daily attendance, 114,876; average daily attendance, 866; number districts, 48; number of legal voters, 1000; books in libraries, 920; receipts, \$25,000; expenditures, \$24,775; value of school houses and grounds, \$24,000; value of furniture and apparatus, \$2000; insurance, \$12,000; average monthly salaries paid male teachers, \$12.00; female, \$12.00.

PARDONProsecuting Attorney
Hart Objects
to itSays Peacock is Not Insane
and That None of the
Jury Signed the
Petition

Governor Chamberlain is in receipt of a letter from District Attorney Hart of Dallas, in answer to a request that he give a statement of the case of V. B. Peacock. Mr. Hart, in discussing the case, says:

"At the trial of the case three physicians testified that, in their opinion, the defendant was insane. These physicians based this belief upon the testimony of the aged grandmother of the prisoner, and from two or three brief examinations of the defendant, while in jail awaiting trial."

"In rebuttal, the state brought forward two physicians who said that, in their opinion, Peacock was not insane, and that he knew right from wrong. Other reliable witnesses who had known the prisoner intimately for 16 or 17 years, said they had never seen any indications of insanity in the defendant, and regarded him as entirely sane."

"The jury in the case was made up of intelligent and fair-minded men, and the rulings of the court and instructions to the jury were eminently fair and must have been so regarded by the defendant, else they would have asked for an appeal."

Regarding the petition now in the governor's hands, asking for a commutation of the death sentence, Mr. Hart says:

"I do not think it should have any great weight for the following reasons: No juror or any other person who had anything to do with the trial of the case signed it; it does not contain the signature of a single person living in the vicinity of Parker's (Peacock's) home, and none of his former neighbors or associates have interfered for him."

"In conclusion let me say that if the defendant is a lunatic, as claimed by his attorneys, he should be in the insane asylum, and that he has no more business in the penitentiary than upon the gallows. Further, I believe the protection of society requires that the sentence of the trial court should be carried out."

To Salem

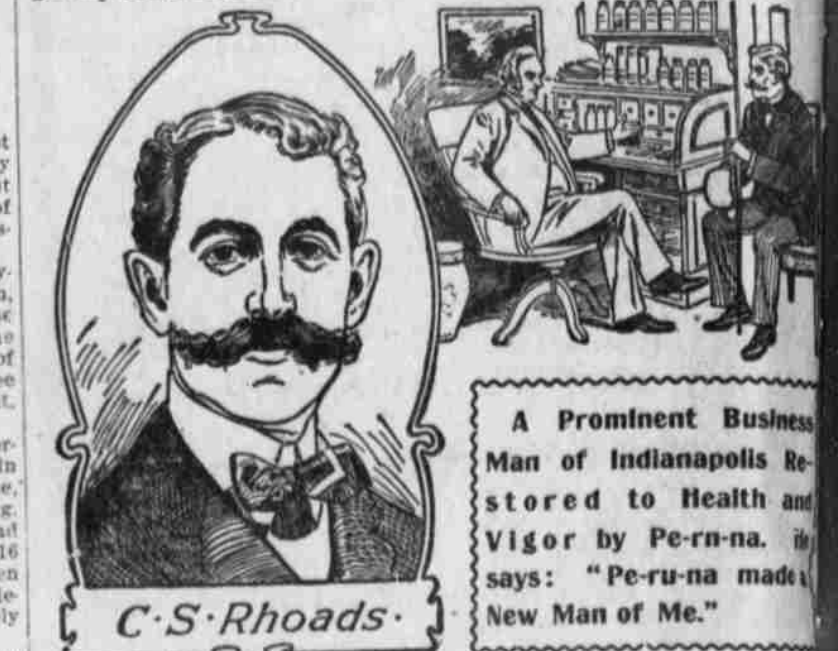
The Southern Pacific has changed the manner of paying its employees, and has thereby effected a considerable saving of expense. In the past a pay-car was run over the road, and employees were paid from this, but this system has been abolished, and the men are now paid by drafts on the treasurer of the company, the drafts and payrolls being sent to the several station agents, where the men sign the payroll and receive their draft, which is afterwards cashed by the banks of the cities along the line of the company's road.

The new system brought quite a bit of trade to this city this week, when the section gangs in and near Salem and the construction crews working between Marion and Woodburn were brought here and paid. There were seven of these construction crews, aggregating over 200 men. All of them were Chinese or Japanese, except the several foremen, and their pay checks averaged about \$29.40. These men were a peaceful and orderly crew, and there was no drunkenness nor any other trouble after they received their pay, but they spent quite a little of their hard-earned wealth for recreation. The company transported them to Salem on the company's train, giving them every facility to get their pay without loss.
