An Education While You Wait

Ed. Journal: To even a casual observer it must be apparent that the country is suffering from some subtle error, and no one thing appears more conspicuous than the fact that the country is burdened with knowledge. Then comes Prof. Boozembatsky with three volumes entitled "Pieces I Never Played." "Should Pianists Pare Their Nails with Knife or Scissors?" "Advantages of Having Two Hands," and so on through a list as long as from here to Jerusalem on the turnpike of the past and to the New Jerusalem on the homestretch. The reading matter alone would consume about fourteen years itself, to say nothing of tuning up the Jewsharp. The aspirant soon sighs for escape from this sentence in finitely worse than ten years in the pen. In the law the student is hauled through Col Blackstone a time or two and then turned loose to mete out justice and equity to property-owners at large and with the admonition to read all the court decisions he can. The state and board has received its first block of school district bonds purchased under the new law permitting the board to invest the funds in its hands in that class of securities. The bonds received are those of district No. 1, Clatsop county. There are 35 of them, for \$1000 each, and they run 20 years, at 5 per cent interest payable at the option of the district after 10 years. The interest is payable semi-annually, and each of the bonds has attached to it 40 interest coupons. The securities were received yesterday, and are today being checked before they are accepted, and the loan will be made as of August 1st.
