BROWNS WANT MORRIS

May Sign With Them for the Rest of Season

A Little Biography Salem Baseball Lovers will all be Interested in

The Telegram last night, under a double-column cut of the subject, says:

Sam Morris, the full-blooded Indian pitcher, who has done such phenomenal work for Salem this season, is in the city today negotiating with the management of the Portland Browns for a try-out on that team. Since the visit of Shea, Brown and Croll to the agricultural districts, there has been some talk locally of the ability of this young man. All of these players had a chance to judge his work last Sunday, and each pronounced it if the glitche character. Basing his action on these opinions, as well as to Morris' performances, Sammy Vigneux began negotiations, and the prospects are now good that he may be added to the local pitching staff. This, of course, will depend on the result of his try-out, which may take place tomorrow, and in any event before the last of the week.

The accompanying half-tone is a splendid likeness of Sam Morris in his characteristic attitude of delivering the ball. There is no questioning the fact that to the pitching of Morris the Salem team owes, in the main, its splendid chances of winning the Valley League pennant, although he was backed up by support that is said, by those who witnessed the games, to be excelled by few teams, even in the professional league.

Morris is a full-blooded Indian of the Nez Perce tribe, and was born in Idaho 21 years ago his home being near Layway. He entered the Chemawa Indian Training school in October, 1901, and will remain in the school for at least three years more, in order to complete his course. Although he started in to play ball in the latter part of last season, this is practically his first season in the pitcher's box, and he has made a most enviable record, and if he continues to improve as he has done this season, he has a most promising future before him in the baseball world. He is perfectly cool under the most exciting circumstances, and has pulled the team out of a number of tight places by his splendid headwork, his wonderful speed, control of the ball and explicit confidence in himself.

He has a baseball record that any ball-player would be proud of. Out of the series of 23 games played with the Salem Raglans in the Willamette Valley League this season, he has pitched 13 games, 11 of which he won, and five of which were shutouts. He has shut out the Albany team twice, the Eugene team twice and the Roseburg team once, besides having shut out the Wasco team in a game between Chemawa and Wasco, at The Dalles on July 4th last. During the 13 games pitched 445 men have faced him, and he struck out 148 of them. During the whole series he has made only two wild pitches, given eight men bases on balls and hit three men with pitched balls. Another feature of his playing is his batting qualities, which are quite unusual with good pitchers. He has been 48 times at bat, and made 18 hits, giving him an average of .375 per cent.
