Warm Game of Baseball

In some parts of the South they play baseball "as is" baseball, special telegram from Quitman, Georgia, to the Louisville Courier-Journal tells about a game that must have been worth going a long way to see. The contestants were rival teams of negroes from adjoining plantations, and the hatred between them was intense. One team was called the Spains. The name of the other is not given. Says the dispatch, in part: "In the sixth inning the score was 4 to 3 in favor of the Spain aggregation, Johnston, a Spain player, reached first base. He prepared to steal second, and to his seeming good fortune, the catcher missed the ball, the man at bat stepping back and interfering. It is claimed. Seeing this, one of the anti-Spain rooters leveled his shotgun and emptied a load of buckshot into Johnston just a few feet before he reached second base. Johnston was carried to one side, and the game continued, but before it was over he died. In the eighth inning the score was tied, when a decision by Umpire Edmondson allowed one of the anti-Spain runners to score. At this one of the Spain players, pulling a pistol, emptied three chambers into the indicator-handler, killing him instantly." The story adds that the game broke up in a row at this juncture. In other words, the trouble began. If another umpire could have been secured the contest might have gone merrily and bloodily on, but the fate of Edmondson was a warning sufficient to deter any one from offering to succeed him. What became of the audience is not made clear, but it is reasonably safe to infer that some of the people who composed it are still running.

The Great American Lobby is a careful study of the lobby in politics, taking Missouri's case as an example, and it is a striking exposition of present conditions and a work of permanent value. The article reads like fiction, but, unluckily, it is only too true. There is an interesting sketch by David Belasco in regard to atmosphere on the stage, and a prose poem by Howard Pyle, Jack London's story in Marginalia, and a delightful literary sketch, called "Alice in Bookland," by E. P. Butler, enliven the end of the magazine.

WENT THROUGH BRIDGE.

Bewley Threshing Outfit Wrecked in Polk County.

This morning the steam threshing outfit of Mr. Bewley, from McCoy, had the misfortune of breaking through the Harritt bridge, on the Wallace road, in Polk county. The machine was coming from the north, and the men in charge claim that they examined the bridge, and supposed it to be sound, when they started onto it, without putting down the customary plank, as required by law. The engine was scarcely well onto the structure, when it gave way with a crash, landing it at a steep angle in the gulch, 10 or 12 feet below. The separator followed closely after, but this only slightly tipped forward. None of the crew was hurt, and the men think the machinery has sustained no damage, except the labor it will cost to extricate it. The bridge will no doubt have to be rebuilt.
