School Money
Apportioned

The annual distribution of the interest received on account of the common school fund was made by State Treasurer Moore this afternoon. The total amount distributed among the several counties of the state for the common schools was \$230,011.02, being \$1.60 per capita for 143,757 children of school age, according to the latest school census. Marion county secured from this apportionment \$15,796. This is, by a considerable, the largest apportionment ever made in the state. Following is the apportionment, showing the number of children, and the total amount paid to each county:
