Springer is Bound over

The case of the State of Oregon vs. James V. Springer, charged with threatening to kill J. W. LaFollett, was heard in Justice of the Peace Horgan's court yesterday afternoon, and, after the introduction of testimony, Mr. Springer was bound over to the circuit court and to keep the peace in the sum of \$50. This charge grows out of the one recently brought by Mr. LaFollett against Mr. Springer and his father, Mathias Springer, and was the result of a quarrel over some grain and hay. The first charge was assault and battery, and the young man was convicted, while his father was found not guilty. After the trial, and before sentence was pronounced, the jury in the case asked that the verdict be set aside, as it was based on a misunderstanding, and this was done, and a new trial ordered, when Mr. LaFollett brought the more serious charge, on which Mr. Springer will be compelled to face the higher court. The testimony in the case is very conflicting and uncertain, and the entire trouble seems to be the result of a misunderstanding between a land-owner and his renter over their respective rights.

Calls for Her Rescuer

Delirious from the effects of the injuries she sustained in the accident on the Morrison-street bridge last Friday, Mrs. E. Rowley lies at her home in Sunnyside crying for her rescuer from the sinking sidewalk. Her family is making every effort to find this man who pulled her from the mass of debris, which was fast going down with the weight upon it, and then cared for her until she was in the hands of friends.

Apparently there is nothing that will soothe the mind of Mrs. Rowley like a visit from this man. She feels that he was never thanked for his attention, and now that her mind is wandering she will not be comforted until she can see her rescuer and thank him for what he did. Mrs. Rowley sustained very severe injuries, from which there is danger that she will not recover.

Shall Salem Have a Kindergarten?

There will be a meeting of mothers and others interested in the work on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 p. m., at the home of Mrs. J. B. T. Tutill, corner of Cottage and Marion streets, for the purpose of forming a kindergarten association in Salem. Miss Ethel Wiggins, a graduate of the Armour Institute, who has spent several winters in the work in Kalamazoo, Mich., and Jaynesville, Wis., will present the plan of work, which is successfully carried on there. All mothers of children between the ages of 3 and 6 should be present, as well as any other Salem ladies who are interested in seeing the city obtain a modern kindergarten.

Labor Unions Want the Law

The Central Labor Union, at its session last evening, took action on the initiative and referendum, showing that the labor unions of Salem are in favor of the referendum, and will do all in their power to have it enacted, should the supreme court declare the present amendment to the constitution irregularly passed, and, therefore, invalid. At the meeting the following resolution was adopted by the central body:

"Resolved, By the Salem Central Labor Union, that if the supreme court of Oregon shall sustain the decision of the circuit court of Multnomah county, regarding the initiative and referendum, we will exert our utmost efforts to have the legislative assembly, in 1905, call a constitutional convention at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of submitting to the people of Oregon a new constitution, and will unite with all other good citizens in making the initiative and referendum a part of the new constitution."

Went Over the Bluffs

Last Saturday, as Mr. Hoffman, a new resident of Fairmount, was driving in his buggy along the road in the western part of the county toward Alpha, where he was going to bring in his niece, Miss Ida Hadsall, who has been teaching school there, met with an accident that almost cost him his life.

Reaching a point known as Cape Jenny, on Triangle Lake, the horse became frightened at something and plunged over the bluff, at that point the water in the lake being over 100 feet below, almost a perpendicular drop. The outfit went crashing down the sides of the bluff, carrying with it dirt and stones. Mr. Hoffman thought that his time had surely come, but in the descent he was thrown out of the buggy and lodged on a big snag, about half way down the precipice, where he lay about 20 minutes.

Regaining his senses, he looked about for his horse and buggy, expecting to see the horse dead, and the vehicle smashed to splinters. He found them at the water's edge, the horse on his back, pinned down by the tangled harness, but apparently none the worse for his big tumble. About the only injury the horse sustained was a cut on the head. The harness and buggy were pretty badly broken up.

Mr. Hoffman sustained a number of bruises, but was not seriously hurt. He climbed up the steep side of the bluff and hired a horse and went to Alpha, at the same time making arrangements to hire a man to bring the horse and buggy to the top of the bluff.—Eugene Guard.
