An Exciting Chase

Placerville, Cal., Aug. 8.—Great excitement was created in Placerville shortly before midnight by the sounds of shooting on a hill just west of town. John Wittmer and Sam Martin, who had been watching the ridge all evening, saw two men break from the brush and run through an orchard. The men fired at the fleeing figures, but did not bring them down. Several more shots were fired into the brush, in which the fleeing men took refuge, but without result.

A score of citizens from town gathered on the hill, and again the fugitives were seen breaking through the brush at the lower end of the orchard. Shots were again fired, but all trace of the men was lost. A small army is now gathering on the hill, and a watch will be maintained all night. It is thought one of the men is Case, who is trying to get into Chinatown for opium. A man, supposed to be a convict, passed through Eldorado today, headed for this place.

Stockton, Cal., Aug. 8.—Local train officials report that two heavily armed men were taken off the freight from Sacramento, at Brighton early this morning by constables. The men are believed to be Fahey and another convict. Nothing is definitely known here concerning it.

Ordered Into Camp

The Oregon National Guard has been ordered to go into camp. The Third regiment of infantry, to which the Salem company belongs, will go to Gearhart Park, below Astoria, September 2d, and remain in camp for nine days and the Separate Battalion, including the companies at Eugene, Roseburg and Ashland, will go into camp at Roseburg.

The selection of camping sites was made for the purpose of enabling the guardsmen to become familiar with their new service rifles. The government will provide this equipment sometime during the coming week, and the adjutant-general is anxious that as much time as possible be given the men for target practice.

An excellent range is offered near Gearhart, and the members of the Third Infantry will put in much time at practice. The surrounding grounds are ample for maneuvers. Adjutant General Gantenbein has found the spot satisfactory for encampment purposes.

It was deemed impracticable to take the battery into camp with the infantrymen, since a range could not be had for the 3.2 inch rifles of Captain Welch's command. At Seaside the battery will be able to shoot into Tiblamook rock, avoiding all danger of hitting bystanders or passers-by. Gearhart answers the purpose fully for rifle practice, but it is not satisfactory for the battery. The battery will go into camp at Seaside on August 20th.

Race War Is Threatened.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 8.—Serious trouble between negroes and whites is threatened at Henrietta, the location of one of the largest cotton mills in North Carolina. Two negroes were cut last night, and one of them will die. The cause of the trouble was the alleged disturbing of a colored meeting by whites, and the cursing of a white boy by a negro. An armed crowd of negroes was dispersed by the extra force of policemen on duty, but more trouble is expected.

Looking for Artesian Water.

Prineville, Or., Aug. 8.—Professor I. C. Russell, accompanied by H. C. Dewey and C. E. Wilson, of the United States geological survey, passed through Prineville, after having visited the southeastern part of the county, and will visit the sections embracing Hay Creek, Grizzly, Willow Creek, Haystack, Deschutes and the Crooked river, making preliminary investigations as to the possibility of locating artesian wells.

Too Many Grasshoppers.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 8.—A Miner special from Miles City says that the stock men of Eastern Montana are preparing for a general exodus to better grazing grounds in Wyoming, the Dakotas and Nebraska, as a result of the ravages of the grasshoppers, the pests having devastated the range of vegetation, until all hope of winter sustenance has been abandoned by the stock men.

They Are Good Up Their Way

The government demands payment of duties on import in gold, silver or gold and silver certificates, and when coin is tendered it is weighted before being accepted. A man tried to get a \$5 piece changed at the custom house yesterday, and the coin was rejected as being of light weight, so the change was not given. This led to an inquiry on the part of a reporter, and he was told that considerable gold coin was refused at the counters of the custom house on account of light weight. "We are allowed five grains on \$20 worth of gold," an official said, "but many \$20 pieces are tendered that fall fully \$2 short of the weight required by the government. Some gold is lost by the abrasion during circulation, but a good deal is lost by the 'milling process' Chinese and others are sometimes guilty of filing the edges of a \$20 piece down smooth, and then milling the piece over again. These coins may pass in general circulation without detection, and the banks may receive them sometimes, but our rules compel us to weigh each piece received. In this way the treasury protects itself from loss in light weight gold, as each piece is only worth the intrinsic value contained in its weight. Most of the tariff is paid in \$20 gold pieces here in Portland."—Telegram.

Cleaning The Mains

The Salem Water Company this morning began the work of blowing out the water-mains throughout the city, cleansing them of stagnant water and sediment of iron rust, that naturally settles in the pipes. This work will be continued until all pipes are cleaned. The patrons will probably find, for a short time, roily water from their faucets, which is the result of the stirring up the water in the pipes. This will soon pass away, and the water will clarify itself. This roily water is only in the surface pipes, and is caused by the blowing out of the mains. The water, when allowed to run for a few minutes will carry off all the sediment, and the pipes will be clean and carry pure water thereafter. There is no cause for alarm at this condition, as it will last but a few hours. It will take a day or two to conclude this work.
