SARATOGA NEWPORT AND STYLE

Afternoon and Evening Gowns--Clothed or Unclothed

Shoes with High Heels Big Eyelets and lots of Ribbons the Latest Fad

Afternoon gowns at both these noted resorts are often quite as dressy as those seen in the evening, the chief difference being that in the case of the latter neck and arms may be wholly bare (save long gloves), while in the former a covering which exhibits rather than conceals may fall in with the order of the day. Chiffon is in extreme favor for both day and evening, the more so, because, lending itself readily to combinations of any character or for any age, while in its own simplicity it may form ideal gowns in white or colors for young girls. Such was one chosen at Newport by a brunette guest of the Vanderbilt family on the occasion of a lawn party, the yoke, collar and cuffs of white lace; the gowns in pink, laid in accordion plaits throughout, and the hat of white lace with a garland of pink roses. At a dance in the evening the same young lady wore a dress of fine white net, finished with lace. Her friend, Miss Vanderbilt, appeared in a gown of mousseline in exquisite floral during the afternoon, and for evening a blue chiffon, trimmed with lace; white roses. At Newport and other seaside resorts, yachting gowns became of much importance and the handiwork are in fine cloth, serge or mohair, white or in some one of those pastel shades that are now so fashionable and a beautiful gown worn by a member of the Astor family was in pastel blue cloth made with box-plaited skirt showing a band of white silk on the lower edge, and an Eton jacket of the material, finished in white silk to match. Linen in home-apron, striped or solid colors, is seen occasionally even at Newport and is frequently noticeable elsewhere, such outfits being, of course, quite appropriate for traveling and outing in general.

What shall be said of clothing, or rather underclothing, bare arms, or those nearly so, thrown in? Shoes are of course low in order to exhibit openwork or embroidered hose, and the demand for white shoes is immense. Favorite styles have three unusually large eyelet holes on either side, and this to accommodate an unusually wide ribbon, tied in a large bow. Slippers for evening sometimes have straps extending almost down to the toe, the two upper ones buttoning over. Heels on dress shoes are painfully high, exceeding all former limitations and contrasting sharply with those worn for outdoor sports, this, however, being in keeping with the two extremes which women affect, the one a bold imitation of the masculine, the other invested with every conceivable feminine adornment. But here is a girl who, while fashionable, gives serious thought to health.

NEW HEALTH BOARD

Meet This Afternoon to Perfect the Organization.

Salem Water Company asks the Board to Examine System and Source of Supply

City Recorder Judah has called a meeting of the newly-elected health board for 3 o'clock this afternoon, when the members will be sworn in, and an organization perfected. Manager C. A. Park, of the Salem Water Company, will appear before the board and make a proposition for the examination of the company's water mains between the crib in the Willamette river and the pumping station. The company has just completed an examination of the mains, a diver going over every inch of the big pipes, and they were found intact, drawing the water direct from the crib, and no leaks were found in the mains where they crossed the slough. In order to have this report verified by an impartial committee, Manager Park will propose to the health board that this body secure an independent diver and make a critical examination of the water pipes for a report to the public, and Mr. Park offering to lend every facility to the board to secure a thorough examination, and the company will pay the cost in any reasonable amount.

The city authorities are anxious to have the health board take up the matter and make the examination, in order to secure an impartial report on the city water.

The health conditions in Salem are better today than they have been in a long time. At the penitentiary, where, for a time, there was considerable sickness and many cases of fever, there has not been a case of fever of any kind in over four months, according to the statement of Dr. J. D. Shaw, the prison physician, and he considers the conditions there as extremely satisfactory. Many of the physicians in the city have not a single case of fever on hand now, and it is stated positively, by medical men, that Salem is more free from fevers of all kinds at this time than during the same season last year.

Sent to the Asylum.

Sophia Dieckman, of Sidney, was this afternoon committed to the insane asylum by County Judge Scott, after an examination conducted by Dr. C. H. Robertson and Deputy District Attorney J. H. McNary. The woman is 24 years old, very illiterate, and would properly be classed as idiotic. She is a sister of John Dieckman, who was committed to the asylum last week, while serving a term in the county jail for trespass. W. H. Moore, janitor of the court house, was appointed to take the young woman to the asylum.

The bids for the improvement of the postoffice grounds will be opened by Postmaster Hirsch at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and will be sent to the treasury department for award.

Drowned in the Clackamas

Oregon City, Or., Aug. 10.—In attempting to rescue his 8-year-old son, whom he thought was drowning, N. H. Weir, of Portland, lost his life in the Clackamas river, near this city, at 4:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The lad, with the assistance of spectators, reached the shore in safety.

Young Weir ventured into the water beyond his depth, and the father, becoming alarmed for the boy's safety, leaped into the stream, but sank to the bottom and did not return to the surface. Since the stream is filled with snags and refuse lumber, it is believed that Weir became entangled in the debris and drowned before he could extricate himself. A gang of Southern Pacific bridge carpenters removed the body 10 minutes after its disappearance, but all attempts at resuscitation proved futile.

Russia wants Them Punished

Belgrade, Bulgaria, Aug. 10.—The last advice here regarding the murder of the Russian consul at Monastir, say the consul struck a gendarme with a whip, because the latter failed to salute him. Russia has demanded reparation in no uncertain terms, and has notified the ambassador at Constantinople that she doesn't care for apologies from the Sultan, but wants the exemplary punishment of all concerned in the murder.

Funeral of A. J. Simpkins.

Saturday night the remains of A. J. Simpkins, the logging camp foreman, who was drowned near Hoquiam, Wn., last Tuesday, arrived in this city, escorted by John Simpkins, a brother of deceased. They were met at the station by a committee of the local Odd Fellows' lodges, and escorted to the undertaking parlors of W. T. Rigdon, and yesterday morning the funeral procession started for Hopewell, Yamhill county, where interment was had.

The remains were conveyed to Hopewell in Mr. Rigdon's white hearse, and a committee of a half dozen Odd Fellows, consisting of Past Grand Master G. H. Burnett, W. H. Pettit, W. J. Culver, F. F. Toews, J. H. Dunlap and J. A. French, accompanied the funeral party. At 11 o'clock the Simpkins homestead was reached, and here fully a score of carriages joined flowers, among them a beautiful set piece, the three links in colors, made by Mrs. Williams, a Rebekah at Hopewell.

A. J. Simpkins was the son of Hiram Simpkins, a pioneer of Hopewell. He was born 35 years ago, and until four years ago resided in Yamhill county, when he left for Hoquiam the procession, which passed on to Hopewell church. Here a large crowd had gathered to do honor to the deceased, nearly 500 people being in attendance.

The funeral services were conducted in the church by Rev. M. J. Ballantyne, pastor of the Evangelical church, of Dayton, and at the conclusion of the ceremonies in the church, the Salem Odd Fellows took charge, conveyed the remains to the nearby cemetery, and laid them to rest on the hillside overlooking the beautiful valley where deceased first saw the light of day, and where he grew to sturdy manhood. The beautiful ritualistic burial ceremony of the Odd Fellows' order was used at the grave, and the Salem members of that order were assisted by several members and Rebekahs residing near Hopewell.
