British Chamber of Commerce

Montreal, Que., Aug. 17.—Montreal entertaining this week the trade of the British empire, the occasion being the fifth congress of the chambers of commerce of the empire and the first meeting of the organization ever held outside of Great Britain. More than a year ago, the Montreal Chamber of Commerce invited the organization to hold its next meeting in Canada. It was predicted that the event would prove of great commercial importance to the Dominion. The full measure of this importance, however, was not appreciated until today, when the gathering was formally opened and the visitors officially greeted on behalf of the Dominion government, the city of Montreal and the commercial interests of Canada. The present included a strong delegation representing England and all varied industries, from the ship-

ping interests of London and Liverpool to all the diversified manufacturers of the midland counties. In addition to these delegates from the mother country there were present representatives of the British Chamber of Commerce of Paris; of Kimberley, South Africa; of Massara, Basutoland; of Port Elizabeth, Cape Colony; of Colombo, Ceylon, of Aden, and of many other self-governing colonies of the British Empire.

The discussion will commence in earnest tomorrow and will continue through the week. Among the matters to be considered, in addition to fiscal policy, are postal reforms, emigration, and the assimilation of the commercial law of the empire. At the conclusion of the congress the delegates will visit Ottawa and afterwards start on a tour of Canada. The tour will occupy six weeks. The delegates will travel 10,000 miles and will investigate all the resources and industries of the Dominion, from the fisheries of Nova Scotia and the maritime provinces to the wheat fields of Manitoba and Alberta and the mines of

British Columbia and the northwest province.

Ohio National Guard in Camp

Newark, O., Aug. 17.—Two thousand tents, sheltering 500 officers and 6000 men, is the extent of the division camp of the Ohio national guard, which opened today on the state camp grounds near this city. The encampment is noteworthy, not alone because the entire division is in camp for the first time since the Spanish-American war, but also for the reason that it is the first assembling of the guard since it became a part of the organized auxiliary to the regular army. The camp is in command of Major General Charles Dick, the author of the Dick law which brought about the reorganization of the national guard of the entire country. The drills and maneuvers, which form the most important part of the eight days' program, will be conducted on a large tract contiguous to the camp grounds. The camp itself is one of the finest ever seen in the state. It is lighted by electricity and equipped with a fine telephone field service, under control of the signal corps.

STILL ANSWERS PRAYER**Strange Story of the Miraculous From Cottage Grove****Mrs. Hunicutt, Blind in One Eye From Infancy Suddenly Recovers Her Sight**

It seems the age of miracles has not passed. A remarkable story of the recovery of eyesight through the medium of prayer comes from Cottage Grove.

It appears that a Mrs. Hunicutt of that place had been blind in the left eye from infancy. The affection was diagnosed by leading specialists of Portland as a deposit over the crystalline lens. At times the eye caused Mrs. Hunicutt intense pain. Drs. Schleef, physicians of Cottage Grove, had charge of the case and they decided upon an operation Friday for removal of the optic as the only means of relieving their patient's suffering. Being a woman of deep religious convictions Mrs. Hunicutt spent Thursday night in fervent prayer that the faculty of vision be given the eye. According to program the attending physicians prepared for the operation yesterday morning. Asking to be excused a moment the patient retired again to her closet and was soon engaged in earnest prayer. Only a short time had elapsed when she again reappeared, this time shouting for joy. "My sight is restored," she exclaimed joyously, and it was true. One of the physicians placed a bandage over the right eye and held objects up before the offending optic. The lady in each instance and without a moment's hesitation, gave the name of the article shown.

Physicians give a scientific explanation for this strange phenomenon, as follows: Intense religious excitement coupled with dread of the operation developed an extreme tension of the nerves which acting upon the deposit over the crystalline lens ruptured the growth and caused it to pass to one side, thus clearing the vision. This may be the true solution, but one thing is certain, whatever cause contributed to the restoring of this lady's vision the case savors so strongly of the miraculous as to give scientists and theologians much food for speculation.

A Mammoth Quartz Mine

In the Greenhorn district the greatest development work in Eastern Oregon is now in progress. This is the brag camp and every man who has been in there this season has come out with glowing accounts of the work going on and the energy and skill being displayed by the different mining men of that section.

Mr. G. W. Daines, secretary and manager of the Fortune Mining &

Milling company, and president and manager of the Daines Mining & Milling company, which companies are operating the Belcher group, the Golden Gate and the Humboldt, is spending a few days in Baker City at his home here, and when interviewed yesterday by a Democrat man stated that his companies were pushing work on conservative plans.

"We have between 30 and 40 men at work on the Belcher, Golden Gate and Humboldt properties. We are not taking out or shipping any ore at present and will not until we have everything in shape for the operation of a mill.

"On the Belcher we are getting the timber ready for the new mill which will arrive some time in September. The hoist at the Humboldt is now in full working order.

"At the Belcher we have cut three shoots of ore 60 to 1000 feet each and are now in on the fourth shoot. The vein matter is from 18 inches to three feet in width and from the lower levels there are 200 feet of back. On the Golden Gate we have 300 feet of back. The vein matter there runs from three feet to 14 feet in width. From this it is easy to figure our reserves.

"I think that it is safe to say our companies will add to their holdings in Eastern Oregon in the future as we believe that this is as good a mining camp as can be found anywhere."
