Many papers are in the hands of anything but what you would call newspaper men. Indeed, some depend almost entirely upon the printers in the office for a readable paper. There can be only one mistake Mr. Pulitzer can make, and that is in making his school a place for the sons of the rich. By barring out the poor aspirant, who, in the majority of cases, has the most active mind, the school may thus cater to the rich, but not to the talent. To make this an institute for a poor boy to learn his profession, and to place the tuition within reach of all, will immortalize this school, and with it the name of Mr. Joseph Pulitzer.
