In one place they could not cut their way through the undergrowth and came out on top of a spruce jungle and before they knew it they found themselves walking on top the dense growth of tree-tops thirty feet high.

Currency for Crop Moving

Chicago, Aug. 20.—Shipments of currency to the West for crop moving purposes have begun and it is expected there will be a steady increasing demand from now until October. As yet shipments to the Northwest have been limited, the bulk of the currency sent out of Chicago going to the banks in Kansas and Nebraska. As an indication of the size of the western movement it may be stated that the First National is shipping nearly \$200,000 a day. Other banks are shipping proportionate amounts. The movement is not altogether westward, however, as some of the country banks are shipping small amounts to Chicago. The Chicago banks are in excellent position to meet the demands that will be made on them this year for moving the crops. It is probable that New York reserves will be drawn on less this year than usual.

Tammany Helps Daily News

New York, Aug. 20.—Considerable interest has been aroused in the auction sale tomorrow of the "Daily News" by the report that prominent Tammany Hall men will become financially identified with the concern. It is believed that Frank Munsey, who has a controlling interest in the property, will tell Charles F. Murphy and other leaders of Tammany that he does not propose to make the paper an organ for conveying to the public the views and aims of the famous Democratic organization unless wealthy Tammanyites "chip in." In the recent Dock Board scandal exposures the News has been the only paper of New York to come to the defense of Mr. Murphy and his friends. Some sort of a deal is looked for by which the Tammany leaders will put up a substantial sum to enable Mr. Munsey to put the paper on its feet in exchange for loyal and unwavering support of Tammany Hall candidates and policies.

Another Pioneer Gone.

J. H. Armprest, a Southern Oregon pioneer, was found dead in his cabin down Rogue river and a few miles out from Gold Beach, a few days ago. It was evident that the old man had been dead several days when found. He was a widower and had lived alone in his cabin for a number of years. The remains were interred at Gold Beach.

J. H. Armprest was one of the earliest residents of the southern part of Oregon, having come to this state in 1848. He has been a resident of Rogue river valley and Curry county since the country was first settled by white men; half a century ago. Heart failure and old age were the cause of death.

SNIDERS BODY FOUND

Thought that E. P. Bagshaw Murdered Harmon Snider

His Nude Body Found in a Shallow Grave near the Cabin, Disappeared Last June

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 20.—Within 40 yards of the cabin of E. P. Bagshaw, on his homestead, near Perdue post-office in this county, the decomposed body of Harmon Snider was found behind a large fir log in a shallow hole covered with leaves. The ghastly discovery was made Sunday by a man who had been hunting in the vicinity of the cabin.

Disappeared in June.

Some time last June Snider, in company with Bagshaw, left this city for the latter's cabin, to spend a few days in the hills. Later Bagshaw wrote to friends of Snider's in this city stating that Snider had left the cabin some days previous on his return home, and that if he had not yet arrived in Roseburg there was fear of him being lost in the mountains.

Days passed, and, as Snider did not return, it was feared that he had met with foul play on the part of Bagshaw. Friends of Snider went to Perdue and engaged a party to search the woods, but no trace of Snider was found. Later Bagshaw returned to this city and told of having traced Snider across a small stream by his boot tracks, but there all traces of him were lost.

Body Was Nude.

The body when discovered was nude, and Snider's clothes were found in the cabin. The present whereabouts of Bagshaw is not definitely known. Coroner Twitchell, upon hearing of the discovery of the body, left with other officials for the purpose of making as thorough an examination as possible.

Snider was a well-known man in this city, about 55 years old, addicted to drink. He has a divorced wife and grown daughters residing in Portland and a grown son in California.
