FINNISH GRAMMAR.

FINNISH grammar is of a difficulty absolutely repulsive. None of the other languages of the same group is half so hard. Hungarian—nay, even Turkish, despite the vexatious initial impediment of the Arabic alphabet—is as easy in comparison. The syntax is at once provokingly elaborate and perplexingly obscure. It possesses fifteen distinct cases and four and twenty differentiated infinitive forms; but, on the other hand, there is no real distinction between nouns, adjectives, adverbs, prepositions, infinitives and participles, so that the student must not be startled by finding infinitives regularly declined like nouns, and nouns taking upon them degrees of comparison like adjectives.

Astoria's Regatta

Queen Frances I was crowned at Astoria today, and yesterday's News gives the following concerning the queen and her court, the costumes and the program; it says:

"Tomorrow opens up Astoria's greatest regatta. Large crowds have already arrived and the city has a very lively aspect. Tents, shows, booths and all the usual paraphernalia of a regatta are in evidence. At 9 a. m. tomorrow, Queen Frances I will be crowned. The ceremony will take place on the royal barge in front of the grand stand. The U. S. cruisers Concord and Marblehead and the U. S. training ship Alert, along with the U. S. lighthouse tenders Heather, Columbine and Manzanita, will be grouped around the royal barge, lending dignity and importance to the occasion. Regatta Admiral A. N. Smith will place the crown upon the brow of Astoria's fairest daughter. The crown is like that of Queen Alexandria, with golden bands studded with diamonds and pearls. The coronation robes are of the finest quality and they, too, are almost a counterpart of those of England's queen at the coronation of King Edward VII—an event attended by Queen Frances I in company with her aunt, Mrs. W. O. Wilkinson. The skirt is of white satin draped with the finest lace, which, being trimmed with silver, glistens in the sunshine. A train of purple velvet 16 feet long will be worn with the skirt. It is lined with white satin and trimmed with royal ermine and silver star applique. A bodice, also trimmed with silver, and a collar of the Queen Elizabeth period, trimmed with pearls and

silver lace completes the coronation dress.

The coronation will be the main event of the morning, followed at 11 a. m. by a grand parade.
