ABOUT HEPPNER FUNDS

Charges Made that
they were Grossly
Misused

Also Claimed that the Com-
mittee Refused to Make
any Showing of their
Use

Letters printed in up country papers make serious charges of misappropriation of funds sent to Heppner for the relief of the flood survivors, says the Telegram. It is generally anticipated as a customary thing, that, after a calamity of this sort, dissatisfaction will be expressed, and counter charges made concerning the disposition of the money collected for the benefit of the sufferers.

There has been a feeling among the public that for the number of inhabitants in Heppner injured by the flood horror, there was an enormous amount of money collected. Those who are in a mood to criticize will find in the Pilot Rock Record and Milton Eagle of last week letters that apparently verify the worst of accusations.

In the Pilot Rock Record, published by John McManus, is printed a letter purporting to come from Heppner to "a prominent" citizen of Pilot Rock, reciting alleged conditions existing there, and making severe strictures upon the committee in charge of the disbursing of the fund.

This letter states among other things that a demand was made by a prominent law firm of Heppner that the committee publish a statement showing the amount of money received and how and to whom paid out. The writer goes on to say that the local papers of Heppner refuse to publish the information. It is charged one man worth \$30,000, received \$1000 out of the relief fund. "Others that lost everything they had did not receive one cent."

It is stated, moreover, that of the \$60,000 approximately that was brought in, only about \$10,000 can be accounted for.

There is talk of a suit in equity to compel the committee to make a showing of its disbursements.

Another letter writer, signing himself "W. S. M.," sends to the Milton Eagle a variety of reports concerning alleged injustice in the manner of disbursing the relief and he adds that he believes it all. He says:

"Families that never had carpets in their houses, now have carpets, chairs and all the necessary furniture. 'One man got a new wagon and mower; another got a new hay rake and harrow."

"A man who had owned an old plug team, wagon and harness claimed every piece of harness that was found and got 40 sets of single harness."

Ready for the Maneuvers

ships and cruisers of the North Atlantic squadron, under the command of Rear Admiral Albert S. Baker.

German War Veterans

Terre Haute, Ind., Aug. 22.—The streets of Terre Haute are gaily garbed in the intertwining colors of Germany and United States in honor of the members of the Krager Verein, or society of German war veterans, whose annual national encampment will be in progress here during the next four days. The society has a large membership in Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania and numerous other states, and railroad officials estimate that fully 10,000 visitors will be here by nightfall. Today was given over entirely to the reception of delegates. Tomorrow forenoon there will be a monster parade, followed by an outdoor demonstration and speech-making at the fair grounds. The German residents of Terre Haute and vicinity have made elaborate plans for the entertainment of the members of the society during their four days' stay in the city.
