Death of Wm. Murray.

At midnight last night, William M. Murray, of Woodland, Cal., died in this city of typhoid fever, after an illness of three weeks, aged 46 years.

Mr. Murray was a native of Canada, but has been a resident of California for a number of years. He was a breeder of fine horses, and came to Salem with "Dable," the great track horse, now at the Fair grounds in the stable of Sam Caste. Mr. Murray was accompanied by his wife, when he arrived here on June 6th last, and they decided to remain here for a time, when he took sick with typhoid fever. The efforts of his physicians called to administer to the sick man proved unavailing, and he sank rapidly until he passed away as indicated above. Deceased leaves a wife to mourn his untimely death, and the blow is particularly hard, in view of the fact that she is a stranger in the city.

Mr. Murray is described by those who know him as a big-hearted, generous man, who made friends among the best people wherever he went. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock, Rev. H. A. Ketchum, of the First Presbyterian church, officiating, and interment will be had in City View cemetery.
