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POLITICS STIRRING IN OHIO

Tom Johnson May take
Nomination for
Governor

Will Make a Strong Effort
to Elect a Democratic
Legislature to Down
Hanna

Columbus, O., Aug. 24.—The first installment of delegates to the Democratic state convention tomorrow put in an appearance today, and this evening, as the trains arrive from all over the state, the inpour will be heavy. Delegates on the ground, and, in fact, all students of Ohio politics agree that the convention will be one of the most important that the Democratic party in the Buckeye state has held in recent years. Governor, State officers, legislature and a seat in the United States senate are at stake in the battle this fall, and the Democrats intend to make a try for victory.

For several weeks the political world has watched with intense interest the selection of delegates to tomorrow's convention, but the result was not decisive and the battle will be carried to the convention floor. And it will be a fight that will have results of vital importance not only to the future of the party in Ohio, but in the country at large.

Two factions are contending for the control of the convention, the nomination of candidates and declaration of principles. Tom L. Johnson of Cleveland, friend of Bryan's, advocate of single tax, of free-trade, of free silver, of anti-imperialism as a paramount issue, sworn to raise the taxes on corporate property, believer of government ownership of telegraph lines, etc., is at the head of one faction. He has announced his willingness to accept the nomination for governor if his name at the head of the ticket would conduce to the success of the party, though he says he does not seek the office.

With Mr. Johnson in the fight is former Congressman John J. Lentz, who is credited with a burning ambition to succeed Mr. Hanna in the senate. Back of this faction is William J. Bryan, who recently spent a few days in Ohio to stir the boys up and conserve the interests of the Kansas City platform.

Opposed to this faction are the conservative Democrats, whose choice for Governor is John L. Zimmerman of Springfield. This faction has the active support of Harmon of Cincinnati, young Thurman of Columbus and James Kilbourne and the old standard Democrats throughout the state, some of whom have strayed into the Republican party on national issues, but are willing to fall into line on an acceptable state ticket. It is claimed that on the main state issues Mr. Johnson and Mr. Zimmerman are not far apart, but that the insistence of Johnson upon announcement in favor of the Kansas City platform and his adherence to Bryanism in all forms brings about the division.

According to the gossip of persons who are usually well informed Mr. Johnson, as has been said, entertains no great ambition to become governor, but, in fact, would prefer to see Mr. Zimmerman elected to that office, provided he could dictate the platform and manage the campaign. What he is anxious about is the election of a Democratic legislature and the consequent selection of a Democratic senator. Whether a satisfactory deal having these ends in view can be patched up remains to be seen. In any event the convention will be one of the greatest importance to the Democratic party.

The convention will be called to order at 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning in the Columbus auditorium, with Gaylord M. Salzgeber of Van Wert as temporary chairman. The attendance of both delegates and visitors promises to be unusually large.
