MILLERS HAVE A PROBLEM

Warehousemen Can Make the Mills Shut Down

Correspondent Thinks Warehousemen and Millers Should Come to an Understanding

Editor Journal: From the trend of circumstances, which are just now forming condition, the flouring mill operators of the Willamette valley have a problem to solve which will require skill and tact, and much rational thinking in order to arrive at conclusions whereby to operate their milling plants without doing a losing business. There is scarcely enough wheat raised in the valley, if they had access to all of it, to run the mills until another crop can be produced. This is a serious condition for the milling men. But this year there is another factor in connection with the scarcity of wheat which requires careful consideration. The warehousemen, from surface indications, are laying plans to gain a position to enable them to squeeze the millers' profits, all out of the business. From the present outlook the warehousemen seem to contemplate paying much more for wheat than the Portland export price would justify, and by so doing stop the mill operators from securing their usual proportion of wheat; and you see millers will then be obliged to pay the warehousemen their price for it, or else import wheat from Portland, or shut down their mills. The warehousemen would have the leverage of two freight rates to operate with. A rate from the valley to Portland, and from Portland back. In case the warehousemen are successful in this endeavor it will practically make most of the mills in the valley shut down and go out of business, because the flour could be imported for less money than the valley mills could produce it.

The only thing I can think of now is, let the warehousemen handle all the wheat, and let the miller buy his wheat of the warehousemen and do away with the competition for wheat between the miller and the warehousekeepers.

The mill men and warehousemen by coming to an agreement of this kind could divide between themselves the over-paid market price the farmer now gets, and would incur much less risk for the miller, as well as the warehousemen. D. E. SWANK, Aumsville, Ore., August 23.
