A Tacoma Snake Story

"Molly" is dead and "Old Tom" is trying to kill himself by slow starvation. This is a tragedy of snake life as told in connection with the skin of a 23-foot python on exhibition at a taxidermist's place in this city. As soon as mounted the skin will be given to the Ferry museum.

The snake skin is entire and gives an excellent idea of the size of the monster reptiles that inhabit the jungles of India, where this specimen had its home. The skin attracted a great deal of attention today from those passing.

The history of the snake is interesting. It was captured in the jungles of Barneo. Even then it was supposed to be nearly 50 years old as snake experts reckon age by the rings or joints. The captor was just three months in ensuring the reptile. On one occasion it broke through its meshes and winding its huge coils about a couple of natives crushed them as easily as one breaks an egg.

The captive was then sent to New York consigned to a show. "Molly," as the snake was named, was put into the cage occupied by "Old Tom," another python 30 feet long and weighing 350 pounds. Molly laid 50 eggs, from which a number of young pythons were hatched. The show moved about the country and while in Detroit Molly pined away and died, never having taken kindly to captivity.

From that time Old Tom refused to eat. In vain many experiments were tried to get him to take a proper interest in life. Another python, younger than Molly, was put into the cage to win him back to an interest in things, and then Molly's little baby pythons were shoved near him, but he refused to eat and seemed determined to kill himself by starvation.

Finally it became necessary to force food down his throat in order to save his life. The services of 12 powerful men were secured to hold his snake skin while jackrabbits were forced down his throat.

After the first mouthful the muscles began to slowly relax, showing that Tom was "taking to his food" again. His muscular movements kept the men tossing about as though buffeted by breakers. But his life was saved for soon afterwards he seemed to take as much interest in the new python as he had shown in Molly.

Mr. Edwards, the showman, happened to think of his brother, Fred Edwards, who is a taxidermist in Tacoma, and shipped the skin of Molly to his brother here, who will mount it and present it to the Ferry museum. —Tacoma News.

Costly Saws in Slate Quarries.

Probably the most expensive saws in use anywhere in the world are those in the factories of Pennsylvania where various articles are manufactured of slate. In one of these factories there are 300 horizontal saws, 12 feet in length, each of which is furnished with 75 cutting diamonds, each saw being worth \$5000. The slate land which furnishes the material for these costly saws to work upon was once so little valued that the tract upon which the famous Chapman quarry in Pennsylvania is situated was sold for a plot of whiskey. Its subsequent owners have taken millions of dollars from the land.

The most valuable slate deposits in the world are found in the central and eastern parts of Pennsylvania. In the neighborhood of the Pennsylvania quarries there are houses whose walls are entirely of slate. The blocks of which they are made are smooth, sawed, and are certainly most substantial.

When slate is blasted in the quarries the rough slabs are taken to the shapings of the "splitters." The stone forms naturally in layers, and the "splitters," following the grain or "ribbon" with his large chisel, separates the blocks into strips. Then these strips are passed through a rimming machine, where by the blows of a heavy knife they are cut into rectangular "shingles." Then they are piled up in "squares," ready to be used for roofing purposes.

When the slate is cut up for use in other ways the procedure differs. The huge horizontal saw, with its scores of diamonds in the factory, is called into play. It is lowered upon one of the blocks of slate by a ratchet at the rate of a quarter of an inch a minute. The saw would cut through iron or steel at the same rate. The workmen play a stream of water upon the slate to keep it cool and wash the last from the cut. After the sawing the block is planed by being moved back and forth by machinery under a firmly fixed chisel. It is afterwards polished, much as marble and granite are.—Philadelphia Ledger.
