FOSSILS FROM SHASTA

Fine Collection Made by University of California

Newly Discovered Beds are Remarkably Rich in Rare and Valuable Specimens

More Fossil saurians were collected this year by the University of California paleontologists than in any previous field season. An expedition, equipped and maintained by Miss A. M. Alexander of Oakland, spent the month of June in exploring the limestone beds of Shasta county, and the material collected has just been received and unpacked at Berkeley. Miss Alexander, although assuming the entire expense of the undertaking, has made the state university a present of the entire collection.

Without doubt the University of California has the finest saurian collection in the United States, and its marine Triassic saurians are unequalled by any collection in the world, with the possible exception of the museum at Stuttgart, Germany. For three years the Berkeley geologists have dug in the reptilian beds in Shasta county, and an immense amount of the rarest saurians have rewarded their labors. In fact the discoveries made have necessitated a revision of the entire study of saurians, since the new specimens discovered have revolutionized the previous classification of these strange reptiles, half fish and half lizard.

It was the realization that in Shasta county there were untold fossil treasures awaiting the pick of the geologist that prompted Miss Alexander, daughter of S. T. Alexander, the Hawaiian capitalist, to volunteer the support of the successful expeditions that have done such remarkable work in that region. An interesting student of paleontology herself, she not only donated the funds but even accompanied the geological party—and assisted in the field work. The total amount of her gifts to this department of the university now approximates \$2500 in cash, and an untold amount in the priceless fossils that have been added to the paleontological collection at Berkeley.

Professor John C. Merriam, head of the department, has just completed an examination of the material collected by the last expedition. He is unable to determine the exact nature of many of the specimens, as they are still locked in their limestone matrices, and it will require over a year of patient work in the laboratory, with chisel and acids, as well as with a new high power electrical dental drill, to gouge out the rock and leave the bones in plain view. Unfortunately for science, this labor is slow, partly because there are hardly enough workmen to handle the enormous amount of material, and partly because the task requires the most minute attention of skilled eyes and hands in order that bone may be nicely separated from limestone without the slightest loss to the specimen.

Although handicapped by the fact that only a small part of his fossils are visible, Professor Merriam discerns a number of new features in the bones in the new collection. A large part of the hitherto missing paddle of the famous Shastasaurus is now found. Hitherto only the radius, ulna and humerus were obtainable, and the exact nature of the rest of the limb was mere guesswork. There is also in the collection a vast quantity of vertebra, limb bones, arches and skull bones, which will go far to giving the scientist a correct restoration of the other new saurians discovered by Professor Merriam in recent years. Of the new saurian, which was so fragmentary that it could not be described accurately, there is now a very large part in excellent condition. A study of this specimen will undoubtedly make the classification of the stranger possible. Last of all, there is the skeleton of an animal which represents something absolutely new in the saurian line. In some respects it resembles a crocodile, but it has enough peculiarities to make a full study of it one of absorbing interest to the paleontologist. Work on this notable fossil will commence as soon as possible.

The occurrence of so much valuable saurian material in Shasta county has led scientists to seek a solution of the reason for this remarkable state of things. It may be explained by the fact that there the limestones, which are found all over Western America, are in an unmetamorphosed condition, and the fossils within them are not changed so as to be unrecognizable. A similar condition of things exist in Inyo county, and in Idaho and Nevada. Professor Merriam believes that saurian material has been common all up and down the Pacific Coast, but changes in the constitution and position of the limestones due to seismic disturbances have hopelessly ruined the fossils. The occurrence of so many saurians apparently piled on each other in the Shasta rocks has led to the theory that that region might have been in the Triassic age a protected area of the sea, where these ancient marine monsters wallowed in the slime of sheltered waters running far into the mainland from the ocean. Under these favorable conditions the reptiles increased in great numbers, and, on dying, dropped to the floor of their sea home and mingled their bones with those of the shell fish that were so abundant in that age.
