Asks for a Pardon.

Mrs. E. S. Hill, of Ashland, was before the Governor last evening asking for the pardon of her brother, H. C. Messenger, serving a 12-year sentence for manslaughter. The Ashland Tribune of this week says of Mrs. Hill:

"Mrs. E. S. Hill went to Salem Sunday night, where she will intercede with Governor Chamberlain for the release of her brother, H. C. Messenger, from the penitentiary, who is serving sentence for shooting J. P. Cotton two years ago. Mrs. Hill is armed with petitions and letters from a great number of people in Southern Oregon asking for the pardon of her brother. The fidelity of his sister to her brother, who has never lost sight of his situation since she arrived on this coast from the Hawaiian Islands some two years ago, is as marked as the zeal and intelligence with which she has gone about her purpose to get him released and illustrates a feature of true family affection that is pleasant to note."
