Appointed to St. Mary's Church in Portland and will take charge Sunday Sep. 6th.

San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 29.—Six prospectors are supposed to have perished of thirst in the desert east of Ivenpah. One of the party was found dying, but was revived by prospectors. He had wandered from the others. A posse is searching for them.

### Storm Stops Race Today

Highlands, N. Y., Aug. 29.—There will be no yacht race today because of a heavy storm which has been raging off the coast the past two days. The racers lay tugging at the moorings under double anchors, with the crews awaiting official notice of the call-off. At midnight the wind was 37 miles, which speed had decreased but little by 8 this morning, at which hour the race was called off.

### Requisitions for Escapes.

Sacramento, Cal., Aug. 29.—The district attorney's office in this city is preparing complaints to be filed against Convicts Woods and Murphy, who were captured in Reno, Nev., the other day, as a basis for application to the Governor of Nevada for their return to the state.

They will be charged with every offense committed by them when they made their escape with the other prisoners.

### Governor Pleads Ignorance.

The Governor this morning received a letter from Mrs. Elizabeth Baker, of McKeesport, Pa., asking as to the death of one John Shellenberger, who is believed to have died in this state last May. The writer is anxious to know where the man died, and the value of the property he left, believed to consist of mining stocks, bonds, etc., and she hopes for an immediate reply with full particulars. The response she will receive will inform her as to the size and extent of the state of Oregon, and explain that the Governor cannot keep himself informed on every individual in the state, and that before she can secure the information desired she will have to give the last residence of the deceased.
