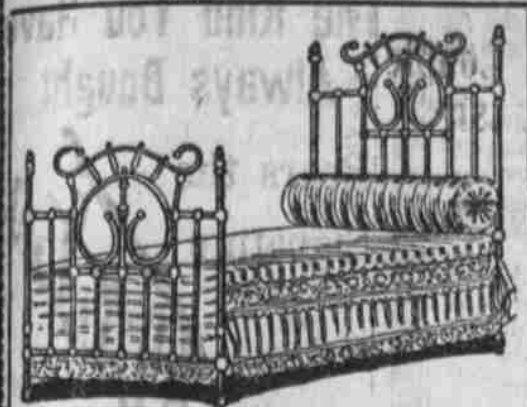

INDIAN EDUCATION OFFICERS

Supt. Potter Elected for the Ensueing Year

The fourth annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Indian Institute adjourned Saturday, after the most successful session ever held.

The following officers were elected for the next year: Thos. W. Potter, superintendent Chemawa Indian school, president; W. P. Campbell, assistant superintendent Chemawa, first vice president; Superintendent C. W. Goodman, Phoenix, Ariz., second vice president; Superintendent J. J. McKoin, Siletz, Oregon, third vice president; Superintendent Charles M. Buchanan, Puyallup, Wash., secretary.

The following resolutions were adopted:

First—Resolved, That the Pacific Coast Indian Institute of 1904 be held at such time and place as may be decided by the president.

Second—That this institute hereby expresses and voices its sense of sincerest thanks to our honored superintendent, Miss Estelle Reel, Miss Henrietta J. Tromanhouse, Prof. J. B. Horner, Dr. T. L. Elliot, Prof. Condon, Prof. Smith, Judge Yates, Colonel E. Hofer, Hon. Claude Gatch and Miss Calbreath for the aid, inspiration and encouragement imparted by their noble words and helpful suggestions.

Third—Resolved, That it is with a deep sense of inspiration that the institute hereby extends to the Salem Indian school its most hearty expressions of gratitude for the tedious and preliminary work of organization, for the inspiration afforded by its most excellent corps of musicians, and particularly for the able and untiring services of our worthy president in all these matters.

Fourth—Resolved, That the institute does hereby thank its faithful friends, Mr. Edwin Stone, of the C. & E. R. A., Dr. M. M. Davis, of the Western Transportation company, for the courtesies and favors extended to the band in the way of transportation, and to Mr. S. G. Irvin for his generous donation of the use of the Auditorium.

Fifth—Resolved, That the thanks of the institute to Hon. W. P. Campbell for the able and affable manner in which he presided over the affairs of this assembly.

The above resolutions were amended unanimously by the members of the institute by inserting the following in additional resolution:

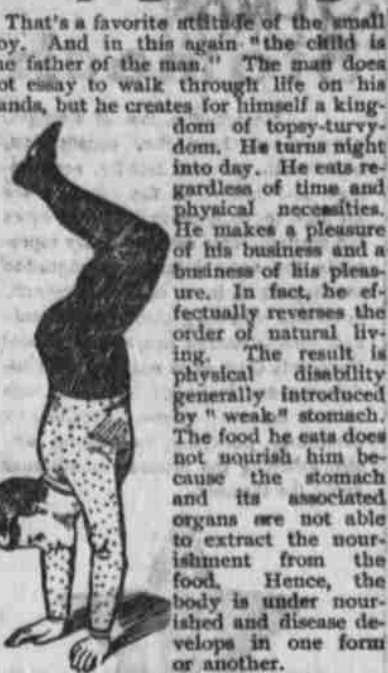

Rogue River Fruitgrowers' Union.

The Rogue River Fruitgrowers' Union has now taken up the principal object for which it was organized, that of marketing fruit. The Union has leased J. A. Perry's big warehouse and fitted it up for a packing and shipping room. A large number of expert packers are employed and shipping was commenced last week when a car load of apples and two car loads of pears were sent East. Several car loads will be sent away this week and from this on regular shipments will be made. The Union is now the only buyer at Medford handling fruit from small growers, and is paying a better price than the commission men. The board of directors of the Union has employed W. H. Norcross, the secretary of the Union, to attend to the buying and shipping of the fruit, the packing and loading of the cars being under the supervision of J. A. Perry. A large percent of the fruit of this section will be shipped this season by the Union and it is quite certain that within a year or two the bulk of the fruit of the Rogue River Valley will be handled by the Union. The Union fruit all having one standard of grading and being packed in the best manner possible it will gain a reputation in the markets of the world that will enable the Union to secure better prices than can be had by small shippers. The affairs of the Union are handled on the strictest business methods and fruit-men will find that they have no occasion to find fault with their returns.

The Southern Pacific makes Medford its distributing point for refrigerator cars and all fruit shippers from Ashland to Grants Pass have to place their orders for cars with the Medford depot officials.—Jacksonville Times.
