BING'S HOP REPORT

Favorable Showing for a Still Better Market

Latest Mail Advices From England Not Discouraging to American Growers

New York, Aug. 28.—The Germany crop is improved. England needs 600,000 cwt. and will grow 420,000 cwt. Our old hops (American) are all gone, bought by England. Brewers in Europe have large stocks on hand and had a reduced output. We expect good selling prices in Germany, and for the cause mentioned, if Bohemians will not excite our market. They have a nice crop and are heavy buyers in our market. The product in Germany will be the best as to quality that we ever had.

London, Aug. 14.—The hop crop at the present time is in rather a critical condition; there is a great deal of mold and the constant daily rains have so saturated the ground that growers are unable to cultivate or, in fact, do anything. There is a possibility of a crop of 400,000 cwt., while on the other hand with a continuance of unfavorable weather, it might be easily reduced to one-half that. There is no excitement on the market, brewers treating the situation with the utmost unconcern, though values continue to gradually harden.

IMPORT QUEER DRINKS

Millions of Dollars Worth of Strange Intoxicants

More Than Seven Thousand Brands, Valka the Deadliest but Pulque out Smells it

For queer and outlandish intoxicating drinks out of the ordinary, the people of the United States paid out \$15,000,000 in the year 1892 in import duties, a far greater amount than ever before known in the history of the government, says the Kansas City Star.

Treasury officials state that this increase is not due to the fact that Americans are an intemperate people, but the increasing foreign population has brought with it the thirst for the drinks of the countries of its nativity. In every port of entry from New York to San Francisco can be found samples of thousands of foreign alcoholic beverages, more than seven thousand different brands of legally recognized intoxicants coming from almost every section of the known world. France and the United Kingdom supply by far the larger quantities, the former's drinkables costing us at duties last year \$6,850,000 and the latter's \$2,214,000, while Germany came next with \$2,345,000; Spain follows with \$678,014; Italy, \$471,362; Canada, \$397,443; Austria-Hungary, \$325,013; Japan, \$246,437; Belgium, \$200,207; Portugal, \$146,537; Netherlands, \$118, 855; British West Indies, \$60,312 and the other countries drop until the British East Indies bring up in the rear with only \$4, which is \$5 less than the Philippine Islands.

How the Stuff Comes.

The fluid reaches those ports in all kinds of casks and bottles, and even in sheep and goatskin receptacles—the kind spoken of in the Bible. But the gentle glass and casks have forced the skin bottles out of the market save an occasional import of the wines of Jerusalem for religious purposes. These include the Jerusalem brandy, honey wine and Passover wine, and the government's "sample" gives it as their fixed opinion that every brand is of a poor quality. The orthodox rabbis and their faithful flocks do not think they could get along very well without the wines from Jerusalem for their religious observances, and the skin bottles will continue to come. The wines have a muddy appearance and are thick and unpleasant to taste and have no chance of becoming popular with Americans.

Valka or volky comes in great quantities from Russia, but about the same kind of drink can be had at any time by drinking the deadly spirits used in alcohol lamps in this country. Valka may suit the Muscovite for the dead of winter, but it is too snappy and fiery for this climate the stuff is in the same class as some of the wet goods imported from Mexico—pulque and mecal. The former is a sweetish-sour beer, and is made from a rank cactus, and is everything but pleasant to the palate. It is a sort of liquid Limburger cheese. Mescal is distilled from the pulque, and is a rank and corrosive liquor. It is a prime favorite with Mexicans, Indians and halfbreeds.

Liquid Limburger.

Intoxicants that are horrible both to nostril and palate are imported from Central and South America. Casaba, or white cane rum, in several degrees worse than any drink ever produced in the United States. In the interior of Porto Rico, Jamaica and Brazil it is made in large quantities and sold for less than common cider in this country.

An immense array of curious stimulants come from the far East—China, Japan and Java. The Orientals never have learned to make effervescent beverages, but outside of this they know as much about fermenting and distilling as do the Americans. In some respects they have gone farther and utilized almost every vegetable from which a juice of fluid can be extracted. A parallel would exist if Americans made whisky from oats, buckwheat and rice, and wine from watermelons, cantaloupes and pumpkins. The government classifies these Eastern liquors into "wines, strong liquors, cordials and medicines." None are very bad to taste, yet none are very attractive—just about on an average with fluids sold over the general run of American wet goods emporiums.

Counterfeit Everything.

Hamburg and Bremen manufacturers are adopting in adulterating and counterfeiting the higher brands of wines and all kinds of drinks. There are good profits in counterfeiting the higher class wines. Every port of entry in the United States receives bogus wines, strong liquors, cordials, essential oils and flavoring extracts from these shrewd manipulators, but at the same time immense quantities of genuine stuff comes from the same places.

Scandinavians temporarily residing in America keep alive their love of home and pleasure by drinking real caraway liquor, Norwegian beer, Danish corn whisky and Swedish punch. The first is a combination of alcohol,

water, caraway seed, rice leaves and anise. It is pungent and penetrating and does not take many minutes to get in its work. The beer is good, with a strong body; the Danish whisky rocks with fusel oil and emits a sickening vapor.

punch is a sweet and odorless mixture of no intoxicating nature.
