## Government in Oil Business

City of Mexico, Sept. 11.—The Mexican Government has gone in to the oil producing business in connection with the operation of the National Tehantepec railroad. It is developing a new oil field on the Isthmus of Tehantepec. Two good producing wells have been bored, and the locomotives on the National Tehantepec road are using that product for fuel. Other wells are to be bored, and the production entered into on a large scale.

## Mitchell is Waiting

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 11.—President Mitchell is quietly awaiting the test of his strength as chief official of the miners, now being made at Novinger, Missouri. If 700 miners there now striking return to work, as Mitchell has ordered, he will be enabled to meet the operators and settle the disputes; otherwise the operators say they won't recognize any leader, who cannot absolutely control his men.

## Big Hole in the Olympia

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 11.—The cruiser Olympia, when placed in the drydock to investigate the damages incurred in the recent manoeuvres, shows a dent in her plates 45 feet long. Water poured from the seams. It will require seven weeks to repair her.

## Forty Million Feet of Logs

It may be interesting to know that the Booth-Kelly Company have 4,000,000 feet of logs in the boom at Co-burg, and 10,000,000 feet more on the way down the McKenzie to the Co-burg mill. For the Springfield mill a big drive of 6,000,000 feet, and on the streams adjacent to Springfield are 18,000,000 feet of logs ready to be sent down to the big mill. The sum total of the logs cut, banked, in streams and in boom for the Booth-Kelly mills at the present time is over 40,000,000 feet, and logging contractors are busy every day cutting as fast as possible, in order to keep the big mills supplied.

The company, at great expense, have put the streams in shape for getting the logs to their destination, thereby furnishing employment to hundreds of men at good wages.—*Evans Register.*

### Sees Socialism on Top.

Charles Goodwin, recently editor of the Salt-Lake Tribune, and before that, the editor of the greatest little paper on earth, the Territorial Enterprise, of Virginia City, Nevada, the paper on which Mark Ewin achieved reputation. That Dan DeQuille and Sam Davis, Otto Greenwood, Fred Hart and dozens of other good ones worked on, has grown pessimistic. He says: "The Socialists will be in power in the United States before two more presidents are elected. That the labor forces are ready to follow any party which will make the basis of its platform the dethronement of the rich and the enthronement of the masses. It only requires 51 per cent of the votes of the republic to bring about this result, and he says that just such a revolution may be accomplished by ballots, before two more presidents are elected on old lines."

## FELL NEAR BUZZ-SAW

## Narrow Escape of a Workman With Vertigo
